

Prospects For Oregon Woolgrowers Brighter

WASHINGTON, Mar. 11.—Robert N. Stanfield, the new senator from Oregon, went into action with a vengeance and has succeeded in making the prospects of the wool grower of Oregon somewhat brighter. An amount equal to one-half the entire wool crop of Idaho, the greatest wool producing state in the nation, will not be dumped on the market now with consequent demoralization of prices. Senator Stanfield and Senator Gooding, of Idaho, had a conference with the secretary of war which resulted in the indefinite postponement of the public sale of 10,000,000 pounds of government owned wool scheduled to take place March 10.

The mere announcement of this postponement does not convey to the general public the importance of the action. In the first place, the public sale of this large amount of government wool at this time, when the clip for 1920 is still owned by the producer and the 1921 clip is just beginning made, would result in a very low price being offered for the government wool, and if sold would be at a large financial sacrifice to the government. In the second place, the sale of this wool, or even its offer of sale, would demoralize the market and lead to further distressing financial conditions of the already distressed wool growers.

This postponement will probably result in stabilizing the wool market and later realize a much better price for the government owned wool.

DOG TAXES ARE DUE NOW

CITY AND COUNTY, ENTITLED TO FEES.

Few Have Taken Trouble to Pay County Tax This Year—City Owners Pay Threefold.

Dog taxes are now due. Mrs. E. M. Fowler, city treasurer, announced this morning that now that the month's water rentals have been cleaned up, she will be glad to have all owners of dogs pay their city license on dogs. The city charges \$1 a year on males and \$2 a year on female dogs.

A tax duplicating the above amount is payable at the office of the county clerk, Kenneth McCormick, county clerk, stated this afternoon that the people of the county had shown little desire to pay that tax so far this year. Last year 500 licenses were issued by Mr. McCormick. Although the end of the third month of the year is rapidly approaching, only two persons have protected their dogs against the possibility of getting into trouble with the county officials. The law providing for raising revenue from canine residents in the county apparently is unpopular, he said. City dog owners appear to have the idea that paying taxes on their pets and a city license should be sufficient. However, Mr. McCormick believes that when people come in to pay their taxes many of them will go up to his office and protest their pets.

BAKER HAS GOOD VICTORY CHANCE

PLANS LAID FOR THE COMING TRACK SEASON.

Chances for Track Championship of Eastern Oregon Recounted by Baker Athletes.

BAKER, Mar. 11.—The chances for an Eastern Oregon track championship for Baker high school are fairly good, despite the fact that Parley Stoddard is the only letter man left from last year. Those who were on the team last year and who are in school this year are Parley Stoddard and Ralph Bennett in the mile, Ray Kinnison in the quarter, Eddie Fong in the sprints, and George Walz and Randall Savage in the broad and high jumps. In the hurdles, shot, javelin and discus, none of last year's men are left.

Stoddard is expected to do the mile in less than five minutes this year. His best time last year was 5:06. In the meet against La Grande, Ray Kinnison will probably run the quarter again this year, and Stoddard, Kinnison and Bennett will contest for honors in the half. G. Walz and Randall Savage can handle the broad and high jump, while Walz is expected to show up well in the pole vault. The sprints and the hurdles are Baker's chief worries this year. Eddie Fong is the only one who entered in any meet last year in the sprints.

It should not be hard to find some students who are billy enough to leave the shot, discus and javelin. Henry Gale threw the javelin about 120 feet the other afternoon and expects to put the shot with the best this year.

Baker's prospects for an Eastern Oregon track championship, if he is a state championship, are fairly good.
