Garage Cleanings

Rakes and Elevates Hay. Motor driven, a new farm implement first rakes the hay together and then elevates it high enough for stacking.

Propose a New Motor Fuel. A company has been formed in Australia to manufacture the motor fuel known as natalite in Papua, where plants and trees have been found that yield 73 gallons of alcohol per ton.

Jailed for Fixing His Auto. A resident of Zion City, Ill., was placed in jail on a charge of violating the anti-Sunday labor regulations of that place, when he attempted to fix his automobile on the Sabbath. He was discharged Monday morning after a severe lecture.

Clearing House for Mechanics. To give increased and better service to owners of automobiles, with an additional cost to the latter, the New Orleans Automobile Dealers' Association has opened a clearing house for car mechanics, repair men and chauffeurs. All workmen are registered and their records for at least two years previous investigated.

Ventilated Spark Plug. A ventilated spark plug is provided with a ball check valve through which air is drawn to keep the center electrode free from carbon and oil.

Perfects Motor Transmission System. Two inventors of Sistersville, West Va., have perfected a transmission system for motors, which is said to be especially well-adapted for automobiles. It is claimed the new invention will enable the gearing automatically to pick up a load on the drive shaft and that it will tend to prevent slipping of the gearing by virtue of the wedge action set up.

Usefulness of Cedar Chests. Cedar is used in various forms for repelling insects. The chips from pencil factories are distilled for their oil or ground up and sold for use in protecting rugs and woolen garments from moths. The resistance to moths of chests made from Tennessee red cedar and Spanish cedar is widely advertised. But the resistance to insect pests is due not so much to the cedar odor as to the fact that such chests are well made with tight covers and are thus physically exclusive.

Theatres and Producers to Cleanse Entertainment

If the present policy of cleanup which continues there will be little need of legislation to regulate picture and other theatres, it is now believed.

Grappling with a condition which both picture houses in La Grande have for sometime felt had to change and a decided stand has been taken against showing on the screen pictures that suggest the lewd or the lawless; pictures that portray and teach crime, and that portion of the public which hungers for such stuff will very likely be disappointed in the future.

When a big picture was to be shown in La Grande at the Arcade one of the managers viewed the advertising matter and his doubts were aroused as to the nature of the production. It was an expensive picture and when it arrived he invited a committee of the ministerial association to view the picture before it was given to the public. They did so, but the picture proved different from the enthusiastic money-mad man who wrote the advance advertising and sent it out from headquarters.

Thursday evening of this week, Manager Trull, of the Sherry Theatre, displaced one section of his advertised show entirely because he deemed it inappropriate for the young people to see. Neither theatre made any hurrah about what it had done, but just did it and resumed business in the normal manner.

People all over the city have expressed approval of the acts, and it is apparent all over the country there is a concerted move on the part of entertainment houses and producers as well to do away with a lot of the viciousness which heretofore has been shown from one end of the country to the other.

One Producer Talks. Benjamin E. Hampton, one of the large producers, recently issued the following statement pertaining to the cleanup which is taking root everywhere:

"During the last few years, in almost every state of the union there has sprung into existence an aggressive demand for censorship of motion pictures. Many states and cities have created censorship boards. The movement already has reached such a point as to threaten the existence of the pictures art and industry. A few weeks ago I submitted the entire situation to the general public through a magazine of enormous circulation, the Pictorial Review, in an article entitled 'Too Much Sex Stuff in the Movies? Whose Fault is It?' In that article I stated plainly that the screen was burdened with subtly salacious sex pictures and declared my belief that the industry was incurring the wrath of thoughtful men and women. Greatest Reform Assured. Results have followed with such rapidity that today it is possible to announce that the greatest reform ever known in the history of entertainment is now in actual operation. Not only have the motion picture people 'cleaned house' but their action has the cooperation of the vaudeville interests and the music publishers. Clean Pictures is Keynote. Adolph Zukor, president of the famous Players-Lasky company, was selected to lead the industry. Mr. Zukor said: 'So far we have been successful in putting all pictures on a proper basis, but all this will do no good unless we make pictures eliminating entirely salacious elements.' Clean pictures was the keynote of various addresses by Hugo Reinhardt, Jesse Lasky, Edward F. Allen, John Emerson and others. Samuel Goldwyn issued instructions to his Culver City studio as follows: 'No pictures showing sex attraction in any suggestive or improper manner shall be produced, and there must be no salaciousness in photographing and advertising matter.
