SERMONETTE

It turns out that the method selected by God in writing His Bible is as surprising to modern Christians as His methods of becoming incarnate was to the Jews. The Jews were expecting the coming of a great conqueror who would establish a temporal kingdom wherein there would be displayed far greater pomp, vain-glory, and selfishness than was usually shown in worldly kingdoms. They thought that when the Messiah would come, the spectacular appearance of the event would be of such a character as to leave no trace of doubt in the mind of anyone as to who He was. And it so happens, and to the surprise of many, that the method selected by God in giving expression to His own distinctive thoughts in a book, was as humble and inconspicuous as was His method of coming in the flesh. The external appearance of the literary form of God's Word presents no special glitter, and neither does it manifest any miraculous clearness. It sets forth no special signs or wonders by which men are compelled against their wills to acknowledge the fact that God has written a Book. H. C. V.

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LA GRANDE NEWS 28 YEARS AGO

From the files of the La Grande Weekly Gazette for December 9, 1921.

Harry Rogers, a circus rider of Tacoma, called on Sheriff Kelley, of Multnomah county last week and informed him that he could put the officers on the track of the gypsies who kidnapped Alma Gladys Miller, 6 year old daughter of I. N. Miller, of Summerville, Union county, a short time ago. Rogers said the gypsies were about 25 in number, and are divided into two bands, giving one-night shows.

A. R. Tuttle, of the Elgin Recorder, made a flying trip to Portland this week and purchased a new outfit with which to resume the publication of his paper. Next week he will be able to say "Phoenix-like, we arise from the ashes, etc." The Recorder office burn-down last Saturday night, was undoubtedly the work of incendiarism.

At the meeting of Red Cross Lodge No. 27, K. of P., Monday evening, the election of officers for the ensuing year was held, as follows: A. B. Huelat, C. C.; H. E. Baker, V. C.; A. LeRoy, prelate; W. F. Snodgrass, K. of H. and S.; William Guild, M. of T.; J. W. Scriber, M. of E.; G. W. Davis, master of arms. J. B. Thorson was re-elected a member of the board of trustees.
