GAS TAXES NET NEAR MILLION

ASTORIA, Mar. 14.—While in the city this past week-end, Secretary of State Koger, in an interview on the gasoline situation, stated that between February 26, 1919 and January 31, 1921, the total number of gallons of gasoline sold in Oregon was 79,195,541 and the total number of gallons of distillate sold during the same period was 7,429,912 gallons. The total tax paid on these amounts of gasoline and distillate was \$829,105.01.

From February 26, 1919 to December 31, 1919 there were sold in Oregon 31,853,988 gallons of gasoline and 4,680,846 gallons of distillate upon which the tax paid amounted to \$341,943.58; from January 1, 1920 to December 31, 1920, there were sold in Oregon a total of 44,290,669 gallons of gasoline and 2,741,717 gallons of distillate upon which the tax paid amounted to \$487,161.53.

From January 1, 1921, to January 31, 1921 the total amount of gasoline sold was 2,449,883 gallons and the distillate sales amounted to 27,449 gallons, the tax on the same being \$24,546.10. It is estimated that more than 50,000,000 gallons of gasoline will be sold in the state during the present year, which with the anticipated sales of distillate will result in a tax revenue of more than half a million dollars.

Medals Long in Use.
Medals are of ancient origin. The word medal, or medallion, was first applied to productions of the mint of ancient Rome, or struck in provinces under the empire. Medals were made by belligerent nations during the war and awarded to soldiers in recognition of distinguished service.

FISH CANNERIES HOLDING BACK

ASTORIA, Mar. 14.—According to advices received here no agreement has yet been reached regarding the prices to be paid the fishermen in Alaskan waters during the coming season. The packers have offered 6 1-2 cents each for red salmon in place of the 9 cents paid last year. The packers also offer \$150 as run money, the rate prevailing last season being \$200. The fishermen have not accepted the offer and the negotiations are still in progress at San Francisco. As near as can be learned only a part of the packing plants in western Alaska will operate this year. An official of the Alaska-Portland Packers Association stated that his company will not operate its plant on the Nushagak river, but is planning on running the one at Naknek. Another company, which has 16 canneries in northern waters, is said to be arranging to run only nine of them and will confine its operations to filling the cans which it has on hand.

MAINE SURVIVOR LOSES FOOT INJURED IN BLAST

ASTORIA, Mar. 14.—J. Howard Butterfield, a survivor of the explosion that wrecked the battleship Maine in Havana harbor, and a veteran of Manila Bay, during which bombardment he was injured in the left foot by a shell splinter, Saturday lost that foot in an amputation operation performed by local surgeons at St. Mary's hospital, the trouble that resulted in the amputation being, it is asserted, a direct outgrowth of the injury he received while in service with the United States navy 23 years ago.
