O. P. Hoff has invested \$142,000 of the state industrial accident funds in school district bonds. All of the bonds will yield 6 percent or better.

O. A. C. students are intensely interested in plans for a new dance hall and community house. The hall will be complete in time for the students use next year. The main floor will accommodate 600 to 700 couples, and will be constructed with disappearing walls, to make possible three individual dances in progress in the hall at one time.
