NEAR EAST RELIEF WORK

POSSIBLE THAT UNION COUNTY GIVES FUNDS.

Meeting to Be Held This Evening to Determine Whether Union County Is to Take Part in Drive.

A meeting of the local committee in charge of the near east relief drive will be held in the office of C. B. Miller, La Grande National bank building, this evening. The committee will, at that time, probably decide whether or not Union county will take an active part in the drive for funds and foodstuffs for the suffering Chinese.

No definite decision was made at the earlier meetings of the committee because it was not known whether or not the necessary shipping could be secured. Definite assurance has now been received from the O. W. that the wheat and other grain contributed by farmers will be hauled free of charge.

A ship will leave Portland on April 4, and all contributions of grain from Eastern Oregon and other points that will make up this cargo will be shipped April 1 on a special train. An entire trainload of grain will be shipped from Eastern Oregon, according to the plans of the state committee. Members of the trainmen's brotherhoods have donated their services in operating the train without pay.

C. B. Miller is secretary of the committee and Frank McKenon, of Allev, is chairman. The other members of the committee include Howard O'Brien, Ed Reynolds and A. W. Nelson.

CHINESE ON WITNESS STAND TODAY

Following the shooting Mrs. Jones had said that Jui Sheu came here and that there was some trouble over a ring he had given her but that he wanted the ring or the money for it. Chin Bill and Jui Sheu met in the room and an argument in Chinese followed. She ran out of the room to get her coat and hat, according to the story she told. Flexer, and when she returned a man was lying on the floor. Chin handed her a gun and left the building. She went over to the laundry with the gun then, she told the chief of police at the time. Later, Flexer said, she said that she didn't know who handed her the gun. Following this evidence the admission, as well as another gun, was given as evidence.

No Powder Burns.
Dr. R. P. Landis qualified as an

expert and testified regarding the condition of the wounds. He said that he was called to the scene shortly after the shooting and that Sheu was not dead at the time but was very low, living about 5 minutes. One of the three wounds was marked by an abrasion. He stated that he examined the wounds and clothing carefully for powder burns but failed to find any trace of them.

Speaking as an expert on gunshot wounds he said that a shot fired at two feet would produce powder burns. When asked regarding whether the dead man was larger than the male defendant, Chin Bill, he replied that "he could eat about two like him."

The jagged wound could have been produced by shooting through a belt buckle in the doctor's opinion.

Dr. G. L. Biggers was also called to the witness stand. He testified that on the evening following the shooting he was called to make an examination of the body. He examined the wounds but did not probe for the bullets. The examination was made just before the coroner's inquest and in his examination he noticed that the lower wound was jagged and that a small piece of dark metal was near the wound.

On account of the coroner's jury having already been impaneled Dr. Biggers stated that he did not hunt for the bullet, expecting to be called back the next day. He was, however, not called back to make the examination.

Hal Bohnenkamp, coroner, testified at this morning's session of court. Tom K. Driskell, formerly connected with the local police department and H. F. Henderson, a railroad man who was deputized to act as an official on the night of the killing told their stories this morning. Yesterday was given over entirely to Chinese witnesses who had to speak through an interpreter, none being able to speak English. Hom Sing, Tom Fong, Ad Dean and Harry Wong were those testifying.

The Story of Ribbon Baskets



OUT of four ribbon-covered or ribbed baskets, selected almost anywhere, three of the number are more than likely to find themselves made for the exclusive use of his eminence—the baby, and doubtless the first of such gayly decked and dainty affairs was inspired by the stork. But even the baby has no monopoly of ribbons and there are baskets and baskets—for the use of various members of the family and for various parts of the house—and they receive their character wholly from the ribbons used for making or trimming them. It must be conceded, anyway, that babies' baskets are most important of all and therefore they properly open the story—which is a long-continued one, of ribbon baskets.

In the group of four baskets shown above there are three more or less lavish examples of the designers' art in baby baskets. Beautiful ribbons inspire the fancy and under such a genial spell baskets like this at the top of the group blossom out. It is a round basket lined with soft, pink satin ribbon, which is wide enough to cover the inside of the foundation and fall in a ruche about the outside. It is shirred in a little rill about the edge of the top and the bottom is tufted and covered like a jewel box. Hanging loops and ends of very narrow ribbon are set at intervals along the edge for ornament. Brush comb, pin, and a small box—all have their proper place in the basket. The handle is made of ribbon and

a lavish box is attached to the left side—all in pink. At the right a little cluster of sweet peas adds the charm of sweet odor to this very beautiful bit of artistry.

A slimmer basket at the right embodies satin ribbon in two colors. The basket is of ivory-colored yellow and its bottom is covered with a pad woven in checker-board pattern of the two ribbons. Ribbon is strange thing; it is so versatile in its uses. In the little box at each corner and there is a small pouch in the checker-board pattern, fastened to the side. Safety pins are provided for by small white rings suspended on narrow ribbons and pockets take care of other toilet requisites.

A waste basket for the living room has a panel of pastel brocade ribbon on each side with plain ribbon edged between. Gold lace finishes the top and bottom and plain silk makes the lining.

A modest but clever little basket finishes this opening chapter of their story. It is made over a round foundation covered with white satin ribbon shirred over it and finished about the edge with a ruche of narrow ribbon and little bows. Instead of a handle it has an extra rim of wire about the top edge, also covered by a shirred narrow ribbon.
