FARMERS LOOK IN TO MEAT COST

(Continued from Page 1)

fairly fat and had been fed on feed that was produced under high cost conditions. He butchered the animal himself and decided to charge 12 cents a pound. He weighed the animal after he had 279 pounds of meat. The front quarters he sold, bringing \$11.15 each. The hind-quarters weighed more and these he kept. Figuring on the basis of the offer the butcher made, he figured that he got over half—and the best half—of the meat for \$12.70. The hind quarters, Mr. Stackland stated ought to be worth a good three cents more a pound, so if he had sold them he would have made a considerable profit on them.

Besides having the hind quarters for his own use, Mr. Stackland had the heart and liver, which would have brought in some additional income to the butcher.

Low Cost

"So far as the cost of butchering is concerned, it took two men about two hours to do all the work and, figuring labor at 50 cents an hour, which has been the price paid recently, that would make \$2," he declared. "Then there are other by-products that the butcher or packing house would have made use of. The hide brought me \$1.50 and that is only about half the price paid when the price is normal. Practically every bit on an animal is used by the packing houses, the dried refuse being worth from six to seven cents a pound. So the added cost of doing business of the packer should be met entirely by the added profit on by-products."

Mr. Stackland said that he does not believe the farmer is getting his just due in the stock end of the business and wants to either see an increase in the price paid for his product or a decrease in the retail price of meat over the butcher's counter.

Farm Bureau Has Helped

"The farm bureau has reduced the price of mill feed and other products that the farmer buys to turn into finished livestock and other products, so I can't see why we can't also see that we get a better price for the stock we sell or force the retail price down. We are entitled at least to market price," he declared.

Stackland said that a cow that is in good condition would now bring about \$35 at the most and that probably \$45 is the limit on the price being paid for steers now.

Don't Like Methods

Other farmers have stated that they have been offered less than three cents a pound on the hoof for their stock. "When I have wheat to sell, the buyer tells me what the market price is and I can take it or leave it, but when I have live stock to sell the buyer comes and asks me what I want and if I don't know what the market price is I must rely on the buyer's honesty, which I don't always like to do. One farmer stated, 'And if I should know the market price the best of my animals look like pretty poor ones to the buyers.'"
