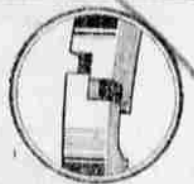

# BOY SCOUTS

(Conducted by National Council of the Boy Scouts of America.)

## LIKE OUTINGS IN WINTER

Winter camps in the North give boys opportunity for such exhilarating sports as sledging, skiing, skating and hockey. All these were enjoyed by the scouts in the various northern winter camps during this season. And best of all they were enjoyed under expert leadership, all troops being accompanied by men versed in nature study. At the great camp for boys of New York city, Capt. H. Beard and other borough council executives were present. Captain Beard, who is a nephew of the famous scout "Dan" Beard, national scout commissioner, was recently made scout executive for the Borough of Manhattan.

The Minneapolis winter camp was directed by W. C. Wessells, formerly of the office of the national camping department of the Boy Scouts of America in New York. Mr. Wessells is a graduate of the New York state college of forestry at Syracuse, and in December was called to Minneapolis by the boy scout council there to take the office of director of camping and outdoor activities. His schedule calls for an all-year-round program of week-end and winter camping.

In these winter activities scouting is proving the success of its announced policy of making campcraft an all-year-round program. Some of the advantages of winter camping and week-end camping during the winter months are that a larger enrollment is thus made than was ever made through summer camping. In winter camps the boys are not bothered by flies, mosquitoes, and other insects, snakes and other reptiles, and numerous other pests, including park leeches and tramps. Food keeps better, and then, of course, there is the stimulating effect of the exhilarating winter air. Also in most cities boys in winter are enabled to camp nearer home than they are in the summer time.

## WORLD LEAGUE OF SCOUTS

The following verses from The Trail, official organ of the London Scout council, voice the feeling of the 301 picked Boy Scouts of America who made the Journey to the Jamboree of the scouts of all countries in England last summer:

## THE SEASCOUT MANUAL.

Of great value to all scouts is the Seascout Manual, the latest publication of the seascouts' branch of the Boy Scouts of America. It brings up points in real scouting which hitherto have been slighted to a degree. It treats thoroughly of study and the use of the barometer and psychrometer. The United States weather bureau signal flags are shown. Knotting and splicing are matters which interest scouts as well as seascouts. These are well illustrated by detailed sketches. It tells also how to make one of those lundy seabags and tote straps; how to correct a compass so it will point true north.

Any boy interested in becoming a seascout may get the necessary information by applying to the boy scout headquarters in his locality, or if there is none, by writing to the chief seascout at boy scout national headquarters in New York city. Seascouting is not limited to the seacoast or to other waterfronts. Boys out on the prairie can organize seascout troops and a lot of them have done it.

## EARLY-RISING BOY SCOUTS.

An innovation not likely to become general throughout the national organization has been made by Wiggins (Miss.) boy scouts. They meet for drill at 6:20 every morning.

## 1,100 NEW SCOUTS IN A WEEK.

Baltimore recently had an intensive scout educational week the declared purpose of which was so effectively carried out that 1,100 new scouts were enrolled in that city.

# BALL TEAM IS INVITED

PENDELTON MAY BE TRAINING HEADQUARTERS.

Moosejaw, Canada, Baseball Team, Is Said to Favor Pendleton for Their Spring Training Location.

PENDELTON, Mar. 17.—Members of the Moosejaw, Canada, baseball team have been invited to make Pendleton their headquarters for spring training, the invitation being sent by wire by the Pendleton Commercial Association through the president, Jas. H. Sturgis.

Carl Walters, formerly of Pendleton and who has played here in Western Tri-State League games, now first baseman for the Canadian team, is in the city and declares that Nick Williams, manager and owner of the Moosejaw club, is favorable to Pendleton as the location for a training camp. The team has been offered the free use of the Round-Up grounds and local fans promise co-operation in securing games for the Canadians. Should they accept the offer, they would come to Pendleton April 10 and remain for three weeks, playing a game each Sunday.

The team is preparing for the opening of the season for the Western Canada league. Lewiston, Idaho, was also considered as a training place.
