NOTED AUTHOR PASSES AWAY

DR. FRANK W. GUNSAULES DIES IN WASHINGTON.

Was Ordained For the Methodist Ministry in 1875 and Has Held Many Church Positions.

CHICAGO, Mar. 17.—Dr. Frank W. Gunsauls, noted educator, preacher and writer, died suddenly today at Washington.

Among the works of his pen are: "Metamorphosis of a Creed," "November at Eastwood," "Phidias and Other Poems," "Songs of Night and Day," "Life of William Swart Glendon," "The Man of Galilee," and "Monk and Knight."

Gunsauls was born at Chester, O., Jan. 1, 1856. He received degrees from Ohio Wesleyan university and Beloit College, Wisconsin. He was ordained for the Methodist ministry in 1875, and since that time has been connected with the following churches at various times: Eastwood church, Columbus; Newtonville, Mass.; Memorial church, Baltimore; Plymouth church, Chicago; Central church, Chicago, and president of the Armour Institute of Technology since 1893. He was a lecturer in the Yale Theological seminary in 1882, and more recently a professorial lecturer at the University of Chicago. His home was in Chicago.

Favors Holland With It's Picturesque Beauties

Yesterday the Observer printed the first of a series of letters written to this paper by Jarl Stockland, of Cove, who is making a several months' tour of England, Holland, Belgium and France, investigating the possibilities for a foreign market for the products of the Grande Ronde valley. The second letter follows:

"LA HAYE, Jan. 15.—1921.—Editor, Observer: After an uneventful trip, across the Atlantic, I reached London January 5. Spent eight days there and came to Holland on a night trip, arriving yesterday morning in Amsterdam, and this evening here.

"Everywhere I find the same conditions, and the same general feeling of depression. Business has slackened up a great deal, and, in fact, all speculative buying is at an end. Although probably 90 per cent of the population are living and acting as they have for a couple of years, the larger business interests are almost dead.

Clearance Sales Popular. "The thousands of shopkeepers in Amsterdam are all placarding 'Op-rumming' (clearance), and prices here are certainly very low. I have seen down full of men's suits at 12 guilders, (about \$4.80), and ladies' coats at \$1.80 to \$7.00, etc; while living, or rather, the cost of all food articles, are near those of home. Shoes are also about like the Chicago prices. However, the Dutch live well, although in a manner plainly. They are a healthy and energetic people, the women particularly average a whole lot taller and stronger looking than they do anywhere else I know of.

"There are very few automobiles and trucks in Holland. The people walk or go on tram and steam railways, or canal boats, and a large portion of the freight is handled and distributed over the cities in all kinds of handcars.

"Amsterdam has some 50 canals paralleling one another like streets, with streets on the side, which makes it convenient to unload all the supplies for the city with a short distance of destination. Kalverstraat, on of the narrowest streets, is the main shopping street, and one can scarcely get through at times, although a horse or auto hardly ever enters the street. Understand that

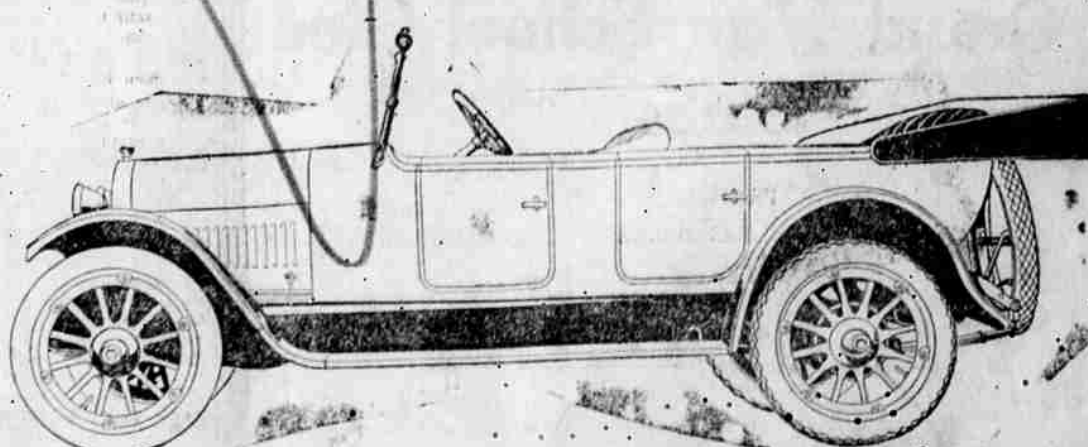
