SUMMER HOME SITE SURVEYED

FOREST SERVICE PLANS FOR SUMMER CAMPS.

Beautiful View from Mt. Emily Sites—Rent Nominal—Fishing and Hunting Close to Camp.

Eight summer home sites on Mt. Emily have been laid out by the U. S. Forest service. The lots surveyed are about 9 miles from La Grande on the Foxhill road and offer one of the finest views to be had from the mountain. The climate is wonderfully mild during the summer, the thermometer rarely exceeding 80 degrees. The nights are cold during the summer, with only occasional frosts.

The spot selected for these sites is a beautiful slope among scattering trees. There is plenty of shade on each lot, water is handy, a spring being nearby and all the comforts of a summer camp can be enjoyed there at moderate expense, according to F. Kendall, local forest ranger.

Hunting and fishing there is plenty in this neighborhood, according to Kendall. Grouse, and occasional deer and bear, are to be found in the vicinity, while Five Point creek offers some mighty good fishing. This creek is only 5 miles west of the camp sites. A mile north of the camp sites, a good trail up the top of the mountain gives easy access to the most wonderful view of the valley to be had from any spot. The top of the mountain overlooks the entire Grande Ronde valley and from it can be seen the Blue Mountain range and the Wallawa range, as well as the Whitman forest.

Applications for these sites can now be made at the forest service office in the old civil service room at the post office. The lots rent for \$5 a year for revocable permits, while \$10 a year for permits running up to 35 years is charged.

Seven of the lots are 100x150 feet, while the other lot is 93x150 feet. Two applications have already been made for these sites and Kendall announces that more will be laid off if sufficient permits are applied for. Additional lots will be surveyed either at the present site or at other places if the applicants desire other locations, he said. The summer season is from the first

of June to the first of October. Winter sets in about November 1 and ends about April 30, the snow reaching a depth of five to eight feet. The month of October and the period from May 1 to June 10 is usually very stormy. Water can be piped from the creek near the present site at a very low expense if the leases of all the eight lots co-operate in the matter, Kendall stated. Timber for building log cabins can be obtained from the forest service.

The Virgilian Plow.

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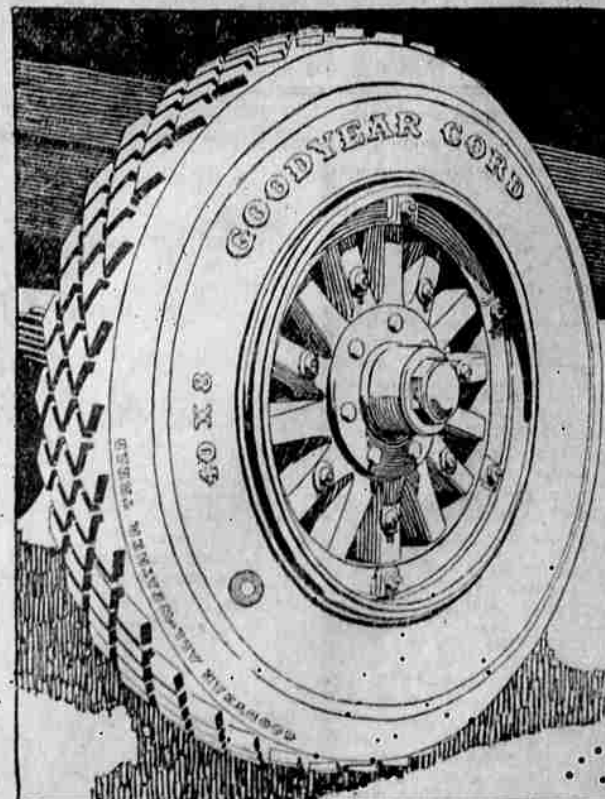
