## NEW DISTRICTS ARE COMPLETED

### STREETS AND SIDEWALKS ARE TO BE BUILT.

### Free Gravel is Offered by Local Contractor For Part of the Work That is Contemplated.

Formal resolutions creating several improvement districts decided upon at the meeting of the city commission last week were passed yesterday evening by the commission. Improvement district No. 114 provides for the grading and macadamizing, the latter to be 24 feet in width and in the center of the roadway, of Oak street between O and Spring, a distance of two blocks. The city engineer was ordered to submit plans and specifications before the meeting of the commission next Wednesday.

Improvement district No. 115 provides for a sidewalk along Y avenue, on the east side of the street, no sidewalk being on either side of the street there now.

Improvement district No. 116 was also created. This provides for cement sidewalks along the east side of Spruce street between X and Y.

J. D. Heidenrich appeared before the commission last evening and offered gravel for use in making the improvement on Oak street, as well as the Second avenue improvement, which provides for graveling one block along Second street at the expense of the property owners.

He has gravel to spare near-by and expects to be able to furnish sufficient for these three blocks. The gravel will be given without charge and all that will be necessary to obtain it, he said, will be to plow it up and haul it. No formal action was taken aside from referring the matter to the city engineer.

inability of the city to find a market for the bonds. The sentiment of the commissioners was that the owners of property in this district should be consulted to see if they wish to have the work done now. If the owners of property in these districts are still in favor of the work as planned last year the districts will be paved just as soon as the work can be gotten under way.

Commissioner David I. Stoddard brought the matter of the poor condition of the water distribution to the attention of the commission in this connection. Mr. Stoddard believes that the owners of property should be informed as to the condition of the water mains, as in many sections of the city they are in very poor condition now and to hard-surface these streets would necessitate much tearing up of pavement to make repairs until the mains are replaced with cast iron pipes, and when the latter is done a three-foot strip would have to be torn up.

Commissioner J. D. McKennon favored paving a 12- or 16-foot strip on each side of the streets, leaving the center unpaved for the time being, at least, and open for such laying of mains as may be contemplated.

President Wm. Grandy of the commission also expressed himself in favor of informing the people of the condition of the water mains so that they could decide for themselves whether they wanted hard surface pavement now or not.

Mr. Grandy suggested that all petitioners of last year in these districts

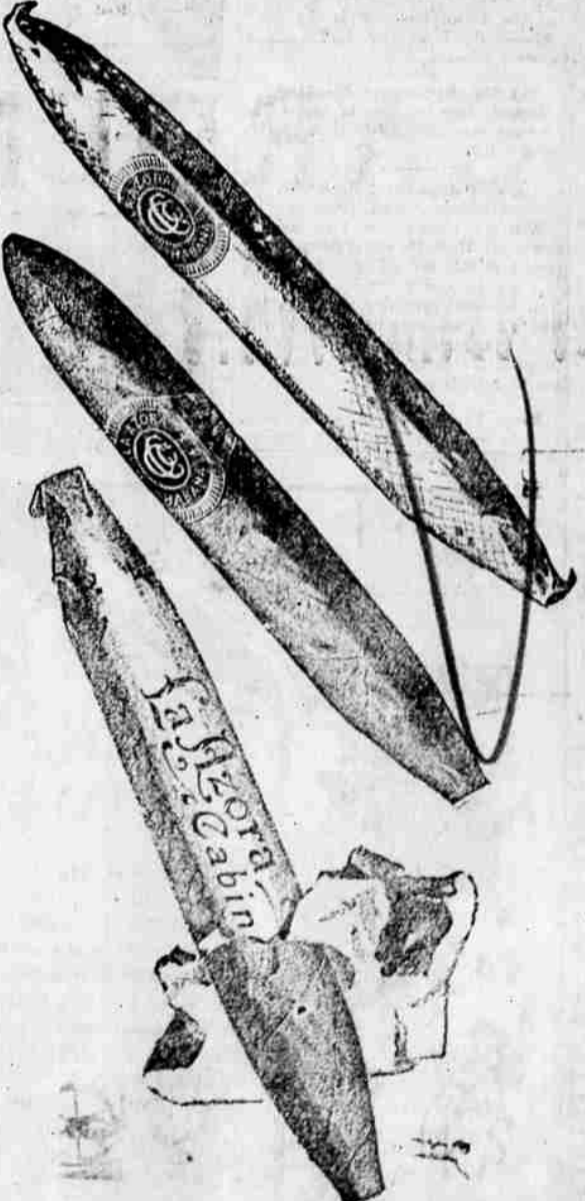
