LIGHT SURVEY IS COMPLETED

NEW LIGHTING SYSTEM PLANNED FOR CITY.

Weekly Report Shows That For the First Time in Months No Fines Were Collected.

The survey and map of houses and street light locations which is to be used for the purpose of planning a new lighting system for the city was completed last week, according to the report submitted to the city commission last night by George Garrett, city manager. Mr. Garrett expects to submit suggestions regarding a new lighting system at an early meeting of the commission.

The police department failed to turn in any money for fines during the past week. This is the first time for many months that the department has not collected some fines or obtained some forfeitures. The reason for this condition was explained by the fact that all of the six cases in which arrests were made had to be continued on account of circuit court being in session.

The fire department for the first time in many months reported an alarm turned in. This was on March 15 when the house of Mr. Koo on O and Willow streets was burned down. The house was vacant at the time of the fire, only a sewing machine being in the place. The alarm was responded to by seven volunteers and the recall was sounded at 4:35 a. m., thirty-five minutes after the alarm was sounded.

The treasurer's office reported collections of \$1554.23, while the disbursements were \$1011.53.

DOG LICENSES MUST BE PAID BEFORE APRIL 1

The period for issuing dog licenses is fast coming to an end. April 1 is the day all licenseless dogs are to be taken in charge by the pound master, with ultimate death staring them in the face unless some one gets them out of detention by laying claim to them.

Owners of dogs are mighty lax this year about taking out their license, according to E. M. Fowler, city treasurer. So far only 31 licenses have been issued.

The dogs themselves seem to realize that something undesirable will happen to them if they don't get the license tag around their neck soon. This morning one appeared in front of the treasurer's office, stood on its hind feet and pawed the window with its front feet, evidently begging for a license. But as his owner didn't come along to pay the dollar needed, he had to be turned down.
