## COUNTY WON'T LET CITY HAVE ITS SCARIFIER NOW

## BAKER STOCKYARDS MAY BE CHANGED

BAKER, Mar. 25.—The question of looking toward the removal of the Baker stockyards to a point farther north is being discussed by the Chamber of Commerce. Complaint of the present location and condition of the stockyards was made by W. H. Colton, a prominent farmer. He stated that the present stockyards are unsanitary from a city standpoint; the location is inconvenient and that the yards are muddy in the winter and dusty in summer.

WALLA WALLA, Mar. 25.—Jake Rathie, under sentence of death for the murder of Sheriff Til Taylor of Umatilla county, at Pendleton last summer, has applied for his war bonus from the state of Washington. Rathie has 25 months to his credit and it is stated that he has a good army record. His bonus will amount to \$325 and will go to his mother.

## FORAGING CHICKENS RESULT IN A FINE FOR THEIR OWNER

Bruce Hendricks is the first victim of the city's campaign to force owners of chickens and rabbits to keep their animals within the bounds of their own premises. Judge R. J. Kitchen fined him \$5, the minimum under the law, for allowing his chickens to roam at will, picking their food from other people's gardens.

Judge Kitchen, in fining Mr. Hendricks, warned him that a second offense would mean a bigger fine, \$25 being the maximum. Judge Kitchen's sentence in this case is taken as assurance that the municipal court will co-operate in every manner possible to protect gardens of citizens from foraging chickens and rabbits.

## ROADS TO EAST PASSABLE BUT KAMELA ROAD CLOSED.

The road from La Grande to Tolocaset is in fairly good condition, according to John F. Birney, county roadmaster, who made several trips over it during the past few days, with the exception of a one-mile detour at the overhead crossing just before reaching North Powder. There are a number of wet spots, but in general it is in good shape and passable at all points. From here to Kamela the roads are still bad. It is still impossible to get over the hill, considerable snow being on the ground yet.
