The Bookworm

"Malnutrition of the reading faculty is a serious thing."
This week we have picked out a random a few of our travel books dealing with the out-of-the-way places of the world, which afford the reader exciting adventure and spicy comment. Even the most confirmed fiction reader will find several of them vastly interesting.

Shackleton—"Unvisited Places of Old Europe" is a delightful book, the author's fresh, enthusiastic point of view giving charm to the account. Roosevelt—"Through the Brazilian Wilderness" has entertaining descriptions of the country, its natural history, of the hardships and dangers encountered and an account of the exploration of the "River of Doubt."

Edwards—"A Thousand Miles Up the Nile." The parts relating to Ancient history and interpretation of inscriptions is authoritative. Stuck—"Then Thousand Miles With a Dog Sled," a story of hardy courage and endurance in the Yukon. Kennan—"Test Life in Siberia," a story of the effort of the Western Union to build a telegraph line on the east coast of Asia.

Duncan—"Dr. Grenfell's Parish," life among the deep sea fishermen of Labrador and Newfoundland. Tisdale—"Pioneering Where the World is Old," which is full of the true love and enjoyment of adventure which makes a bullock cart journey through Manchuria a lark.

O'Brien—"White Shadows in the South Seas," an account of a sojourn among the native descendants of the cannibals. "Exploding Eggs" is the name of the author's valet and the other natives are as quaintly named. A very popular book.

The long-awaited shipment of new fiction has been received from the East and was placed this week on the shelves, both at the central library and at the branch libraries in Elgin, Union and Cove.

Beginning the first Monday in April the Public Library will be open week days from 10 a. m. to 6 p. m. and from 7 p. m. to 9 p. m. This is the first time the Library has been open regularly of mornings, and is made possible by the addition of another librarian to the staff.

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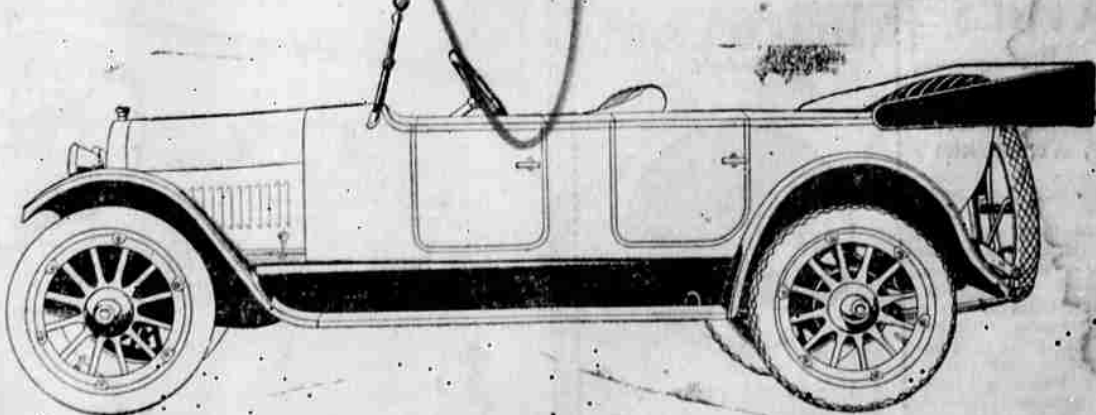
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
