COLONEL BAKER ESTATE IS MYTH

BRADSTREET SENDS OUT LETTER REGARDING IT.

Fast Estate in Philadelphia Causes Great Sensation Throughout the Country.

Oregon people interested in the Colonel Jacob Baker estate in Philadelphia, regarding which wide publicity has been given recently, have obtained authoritative information from the Bradstreet company concerning this estate. There are several reputed heirs living in this state, persons who are undeniably descendants of the Bakers mentioned.

The Bradstreet agency in Philadelphia reported that for years that it agency has known of the so-called estate, and had known for years that it is a myth. They asked that if anyone knew any person helping to perpetuate the fraud, the name of that person be forwarded and placed in the hands of postal inspectors.

Accompanying the letter with the report was a clipping from the Philadelphia Inquirer of March 24. The clipping said that Mayor Moore, of Philadelphia, finding that the Jacob Baker estate matter was assuming importance equalling the famous "Spanish Fortune," asked the bureau of legal aid to make an investigation and report. This investigation was made and the report made public. John H. Bradway, chief counsel for the bureau of legal aid of Philadelphia, says in his findings:

"There was an estate of Jacob Baker, a Revolutionary veteran, which was handled by the orphans' court of Philadelphia county. The records of that court show it was disposed of about 1847 and the estate was valued at about \$5000 or \$7000, as set forth in the account which was filed.

"The fake Baker estate, which has been used as a bait throughout the entire country, was supposed to consist of a 99-year lease on certain real estate in the city of Philadelphia, part of which is now occupied by the city hall, and on additional real estate situated in Chillotheo, O.

"The persons who use this nebulous estate as a means of obtaining money from unsuspecting victims by the name of Baker declare that the 99-year lease has just expired, and that this enormous estate of Jacob Baker, valued at \$800,000,000, is about to be distributed. The records disclose no orphans' court reports the whole matter as a fraud and the register of lease or any such property right. The wills office has gone so far as to print a postal card to this effect for distribution to inquirers."

FEDERAL GAME WARDEN CHANGED

BAKER, Mar. 29.—The Baker Rod and Gun club has been notified that George Tonkin, limited states game warden whose headquarters have been in Boise, Idaho, has been ordered to move to Baker about April 1, this point being more centrally located for the district which he covers.

Before his appointment to the U. S. game service Mr. Tonkin was for a number of years a game warden of Oregon, being located in Pendleton for a time and later as a representative of the state game department on special duty in central Oregon.

WOOD WILL ACCEPT UNIVERSITY POST

WASHINGTON, Mar. 29.—When he returns from the Philippines Major General Leonard Wood will retire from active service in the army to become head of Pennsylvania University. It has been learned at the war department. The general notified Secretary Weeks that if he was nominated for the university post, as he was recently, he would desire to go on the retired list as soon as he had completed his mission in the far east.

The real reason for the Wood-Forbes mission to the Philippines and the searching investigation of conditions to be made in the islands is to determine whether the Filipinos are ready for independence, Secretary Weeks said today.

SHEEP SHEARING SEASON DATE SET

PENDLETON, Mar. 29.—The sheep shearing season will probably open April 10 in this county, say shepherders who expect to pay from 10 to 12 1/2 cents per head to shearers. This is a decrease over last year's price when 26 cents per head, exclusively of growers paid as high as 17 1/2 cents per head. Shearers are at work in Klickitat valley.

Washington now and are receiving a maximum of 12 1/2 cents per head, while in Idaho the price was from nine to 10 cents. Sheep in this region shear more easily than in Washington, say woolmen, because of the difference in the soil. This year the Klickitat Wool Growers' association fixed a sliding scale of from 10 to 13 cents per head. Last year as high as 26 cents per head, exclusively of growers paid as high as 17 1/2 cents per head, was paid for shearing in the
