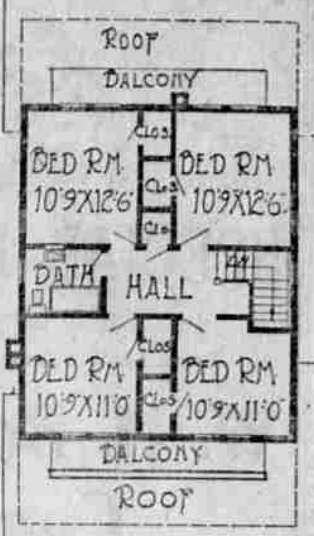
Many people prefer the house to the
apartment because they want to get
away from the inevitable crowding
which is found in buildings of the latter
type. Especially is this the case
if there are children in the family.
The "kiddies" need plenty of sunshine
and recreation to develop into healthy
men and women and these privileges
are not very often found in the large
apartment building. The home in-
sures a yard, plenty of breathing space,
bedrooms and comfortable rooms. For
this purpose the story-and-a-half
house is very excellently adapted.
Not too large and yet ample for the
needs of a family of five or six, it can
be constructed at a very reasonable
cost. To the average family the item
of cost is one of utmost importance.

As the average man builds a home
but once in a lifetime, it is a propo-
sition of importance and one that he
should study carefully before attempt-
ing. While seeking an attractive
home as possible he also wants one
that possesses permanency and pro-
tection against fire. For these two
qualities brick is unexcelled. In the
home shown here, the builder has pre-
sented the owner with a charming

arrangement for the housewife. A door
at the far end of the dining room
opens into a bedroom very conven-
iently situated for the cook or maid.
It has a large clothes closet.

A pantry and breakfast nook both
connected with the kitchen complete
this first-floor plan. Breakfast nooks
have come to be considered an impor-
tant necessity to the modern home
because of their convenience in serv-
ing lunches and breakfasts. This lit-
tle nook saves the trouble of serving
meals in the larger dining room.

On the upper floor are four bed-
rooms grouped about a central hall,
also the bathroom. All of the bed-
rooms have windows on two sides, in-
suring plenty of ventilation and light,
two important features in sleeping
quarters. The old idea of keeping the
air out at night in the bedrooms has



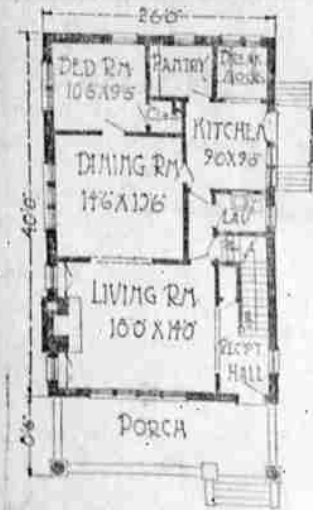
Second Floor Plan.

lost its hold in most homes. That is
why bedrooms in new homes are pro-
vided with as much window space as
possible. The closets in these bed-
rooms are exceptionally large. An
additional closet off the hall provides
a storage place for clothing out of



house as well as sturdy and safe one.
The exterior is most attractive, be-
ing of brick and stucco above, with
stucco balustrade around the front porch.
The porch is very large and inviting,
and one that is excellently adapted
for a recreation place for the family
and children.

It is recessed under an extension of
the main gable roof, and is enhanced
by attractive stout white pillars and
brick approaches. The front door is
plain but attractive and opens into a
small vestibule or reception hall.
This hall leads to the living room on
the left and to the stairs going up
the living room is the main room of
the home and very comfortable in
size and equipment. On one side is
an open brick fireplace, flanked on
either side by wall bookcases. Two
small windows above these cases sup-

plyment the excellent lighting pro-
vided by four windows facing the
porch. The living room is 15 feet
wide and 14 feet long.

An open doorway leads from the
room into the dining room directly to
the rear. This room is not quite as
large, 14 feet 6 inches by 12 feet 6
inches, but ample for the needs of the
family and well lighted by a triple
side window. It opens on the right
into a small hall which leads to the
bathroom and kitchen. The latter
room is small and very convenient to
the dining room, an important ad-

CONGRESSMEN FAVOR FILIPINO INDEPENDENCE

Washington.—"The
appointed hour is
here: let the Phil-
ippines be free."

This was the key-
note of a speech by
Congressman Ed-
ward J. King of Illi-
nois, (Republican) in which he re-
viewed the American oc-
cupation of the islands from the first
day to the present
time. He declared
that the United
States was honor-
bound to grant in-
dependence without further delay.

Congressman King is one of an in-
creasing number of Republicans in the
House who are urging quick action
on Philippine independence. Mr.
King is the author of a bill which
provides that within one year the Phil-
ippine government, under presidential
proclamation, may assemble a conven-
tion and frame a constitution.

After the constitution is ratified by
the Filipino people the President may
recognize the Philippine Islands as a
separate and self-governing nation.

The transfer of authority is to be
completed within one year. Provision
is made for safeguarding American in-
vestments in the Philippines and for
the providing of custom stations and
submarine bases in the islands by the
United States.

Word from the Philippines is that
the people expect early independence
and will be sorely disappointed if they
do not get it.

"No nation has the right," said Con-
gressman King "to hold another people
in bondage, even though it may be
argued by the proponent that the
condition is simply one of tutelage."

"A little more observance of the
golden rule in national and interna-
tional affairs would soon dispel that
desire for exploitation, the fiercest foe
of freedom in the world today."

"When we went to the Philippines
we declared before the whole world
that we were not actuated by any self-
ish desire of conquest or territorial
aggrandizement, but solely by humani-
tarian impulses."

Congressman King called attention
to the fact that Filipinos are now
raising funds to erect a monument to
Admiral Dewey, which he said was in-
directly a tribute to the American peo-
ple as well as to Dewey. He recalled
the cable that Dewey had sent to
President McKinley, which was as
follows:

"In my opinion these people (Phil-
ippines) are superior in intelligence and
more capable of self government than
the natives of Cuba, and I am familiar
with both."

Congressman King then recited the
preamble to the Jones law, passed
August 29, 1916, and declared it was a
definite pledge of independence. The
preamble stated "it is as it has always
been the purpose of the people of the
United States to withdraw their
sovereignty over the Philippine Islands
and to recognize their independence as
soon as a stable government can be
established therein."

Congressman King stated there was
no question but that the Filipinos had
established the specified stable govern-
ment and, therefore, it is the
solemn duty of the United States to
grant the promised independence.

ASKS INDEPENDENCE FOR PHILIPPINES

Manila.—Francis Burton Harrison, former
governor of the Philippines, is
offered to tender his resignation
eighteen months ago upon
condition that the Secretary of War
recommend to President Wilson
that a Filipino be appointed his suc-
cessor. He made the offer while in
Washington in 1919.

Discussing Philippine independence,
the governor general said:

"I can see in the future a very
beautiful vision. When the flag of
the Philippine republic shall be hoisted,
when the Stars and Stripes will
come flitting down to the strains of
"The Star Spangled Banner"—that flag,
Old Glory, so rich in happy and hon-
orable achievements, will be made
doubly dear because it will mean that
the United States will have kept its
word to the people of the Philippine
Islands."

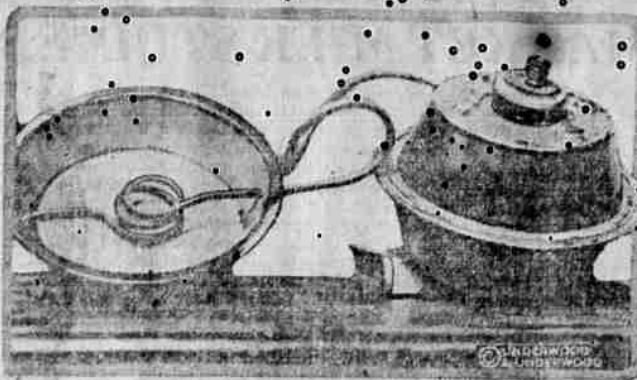
School of Journalism in Philippines

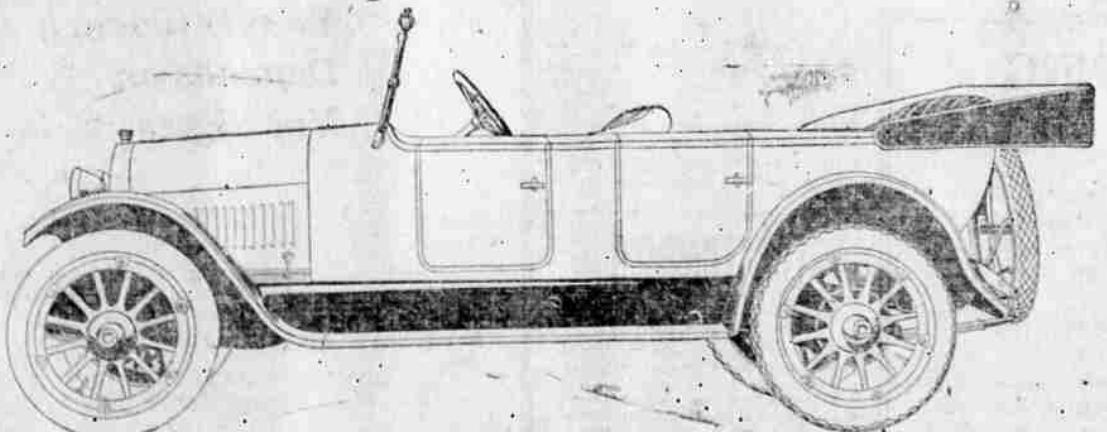
