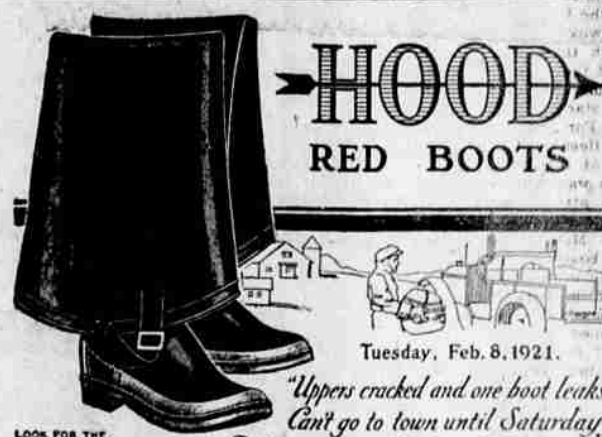

## HE TAGS WILD BIRDS



F. C. Lincoln, bird specialist of the bureau of biological survey, Department of Agriculture, is busy engaged in tagging 100,000 North American birds for the purpose of studying their habits. Bands are placed on the birds' legs, giving the date and place of banding. They are then released. Many of the birds travel thousands of miles before returning or being captured. Since the government has taken over the work of the American Bird Banding association, approximately 20,000 have been banded. Mr. Lincoln is shown holding a wild duck which he had tagged at the zoological gardens, Washington.
