REAL ESTATE
MEN TO MEET

It is likely that a number of local
real estate men will attend the meet-
ing of the national association of real
estate dealers in Chicago in July,
when two trainloads of northwest real
estate men will go to the windy city,
according to Sherwood Williams, who
is among those contemplating going
to the meeting.

Arrangements have been complet-
ed whereby the special trains bear-
ing the California delegations to the
convention will meet the specials from
the Northwest at Salt Lake City, and
the entire western delegation will
from there, go in a body to Chicago.
Fred O. Brockman, secretary of the
Inter-State Realty Association, made
this announcement after having been
in touch with the realty headquarters
of the state of California.

Mr. Brockman has been arranging
for train schedules and rates to the
convention and is now mailing out to
2500 realtors in the Northwest the
details of the proposed trip to Chicago.
A round trip rate of \$125, pro-
viding for a 28-day stopover, has been
arranged. The delegates will go to
the convention by the special trains
and will return as they see fit. This
will give those who wish to make a
trip to the east before the return
home the opportunity to do so.

Mr. Brockman announced that new
delegates to the convention are being
signed up every day and present indi-
cations are that two special trains
will be required to take the delega-
tion from the Northwest to the con-
vention.

Present indications are that the
gathering at Chicago will be the larg-
est assemblage of business men ever
held in the United States, according
to reports of those who are in touch
with the progress of the convention
plans. Speakers of national reputa-
tion will be on the program and there
will be conferences on various sub-
jects of vital importance to real es-
tate holders.

One of the big problems to be tak-
en up will be that of taxation and an
effort will be made to work out some
plan whereby real estate will not be
required to bear the greater burden
of taxation.

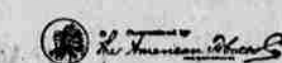
