Bright, cheerful, well ventilated rooms keep the blood flowing quickly.

DIRT ROADS ARE GRADED

According to the report of George Garrett, city manager, submitted to the city commission last evening at the regular weekly meeting, improvement district installment payments contributed the greater part of the \$1315.88 received by the treasurer's office during the week ending March 26, 1921. The amount of installments collected during the week was \$1,007.43, and in addition to this \$226.29 in improvement district interest was collected. Water rentals amounted to only \$40.75 and licenses and various permits brought in \$32.

The disbursements amounted to \$257.78 for improvement district payments and interest. The police department contributed \$155 in fines. Five arrests were reported during the week and one conviction was secured, with 4 cases still pending.

MISTREATMENT BY JAPS DENIED

TRAVEL IN JAPAN SAID TO BE AS SAFE AS EVER.

Reports From the United States Had Reached Japan that Travelers Were Mistreated.

TOKIO, Feb. 24.—(By Correspondence.)—Reports from the United States of alleged mistreatment in Japan purporting to come from returned travelers from the Orient have caused Mr. C. Inomata, of the Japan Tourist Bureau, to issue a denial of such charges.

Mr. Inomata's statement is contained in a letter written to San Francisco for the purpose of letting would-be travelers know that contrary to stories circulated in the United States in some quarters, travel in this country is as safe as it ever was.

In explaining the letter Mr. Inomata said that if such reports continued in the United States it would mean a serious injury to tourist trade, not only to the travel in Japan but to the entire Orient, for the reason that Japan has in the past been one of the chief attractions to these contemplating Oriental tours.

"We feel that Japan is being misrepresented in America," the statement says in part. "This emphasizes the importance, not to say necessity of more Americans coming to Japan. Japan should not be judged by utterances, spoken or printed, of prejudiced or self-interested people. The truth of these utterances should not be blindly accepted, but tested by personal observation and experience."

"American tourists in Japan, many of whom call at our office, are unanimous in their expression of satisfaction regarding the treatment they have received in this country. Americans are assured of courtesy and politeness and the good-will of our people."

MINING MAP IS DRAWN IN COLOR

CAREFULLY EXECUTED MAP TO BE SHOWN AT CONVENTION.

Map Shows Important Ores and Location of Mines in Eastern Oregon Prepared for Baker Exhibit.

BAKER, Mar. 31.—An important feature of the Baker district mineral exhibit at the International Mining convention at Portland April 5-9 is a large map, 9 by 12 feet. The map is painted in colors and shows every mining section in Baker district. All railroads, highways, postroads, market roads and other roads are shown, as are the streams, lakes and mountain ranges. It covers parts of Umatilla, Union, Walla Walla, Grant and Malheur counties, and all of Baker county and a section of Idaho along the Snake river. Baker is shown as the hub of the area with all of the sub-districts.

The map is painted in colors. The different metals and products of the sub-districts are represented in colors, with the central point of each painted in the colors representing its product.

Below the map is listed the mining products of the area shown, as follows: Gold, silver, copper, gypsum, chrome, granite, building stone, fire clay, antimony, cement, lead, molybdenum, manganese.

The sub-districts listed are: Cornucopia, Homestead, Gypsum, Lime, Durkee, (Mormon Basin), Pleasant Valley, Bayler, Haines, Rock Creek, Granite, Grenhorn, Prairie City, Canyon City, Susanville, Unity, Bridgeport, Malheur, Lake, Virtue and Sanger.

Irish Poplin Supreme.

Ireland leads the world in the manufacture of poplin and, although most of the silk used is of foreign manufacture, the Dublin weavers treat it in such a manner as to make Irish poplin a distinct fabric. It is composed of worsted made from the finest wool, and silk in combination, and no makers but the Irish seem to be able to produce the softness of texture and brilliancy of coloring that is so characteristic of the best poplin. This is attributed to the peculiarity of the Dublin water and the skill and knowledge of the makers.

An All-British Bird.

The red grouse—probably the most sporting bird that flies—has never been known to nest outside the limits of the British Isles. This bird flourishes in every Scottish county and in most counties of Ireland and Wales. In England the grouse thrives only as far south as Derbyshire, all attempts to stock more southern districts, even when apparently suitable for the purpose, having proved failures, though some grouse survived for quite a long time after such an experiment in the Thetford district.

Hygienic Sleeping Rooms.

A sunbath, at frequent intervals, is effective in keeping the bedding healthy, sweet and wholesome. To this is added, of course, daily airing of the bed clothes for not less than two hours. Eldersdown quilts, though tempting to the eye of the housewife, are not as hygienic a covering as the more easily washed woolen blankets. As at least a third of our lives is spent in the bedroom it behooves us to see that it is clean, airy and hygienic, otherwise refreshing sleep will be impossible, and health will suffer.

Guatemala.

Guatemala has an area of 48,396 square miles, slightly larger than that of the state of New York. It has a population of about 2,000,000, which is approximately 40 per cent of the entire population of Central America. A large part of the population of Guatemala is of Indian blood, unmixed with the blood of Europeans. In this respect Guatemala differs from its four neighboring republics, in three of which the majority of the population is of mixed blood, and to one of which the Indians were exterminated.—National Geographic Society Bulletin.
