WATERPOWER DEVELOPMENT IS DISCUSSED

frictions are unreasonable and unjust in principle and in practice will prevent the financing of new projects to any considerable extent. Mr. Griffith made the principle statement to the commission and he objected principally to three things. First—an arbitrary calculation as to the life of the project and based on that an arbitrary requirement of reserves for

depreciation; second, an arbitrary requirement for an accounting system; and third, a tendency to duplicate state control with federal supervision.

Must Meet Regulations.

Mr. Griffith stated that all of the power developers now have to conform to the regulations laid down by state utility commissions, both as to accounting and depreciation. He asserted that the regulation attempting to force upon the power companies a federal system of accounting would lead to difficulty and confusion. He insisted that the arbitrary provision for depreciation reserve was unfair and tended to minimize the amount

that the United States government would have to pay for the property if it elected to purchase it at the end of fifty years.

Bankers Want High Fee.

E. W. Clark, an investment banker of Philadelphia and a director of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, in response to questions of Chairman Weeks, stated that bankers would insist on 9 1/4 to 10 per cent for financing water power projects which had to be started from the ground up unless the company doing the development had already established credit and was a going concern. Chairman Weeks questioned Colonel Hugh L. Cooper, known throughout the West as an engineer prominent in water power development, as to how much of the pending application totaling \$2,000,000,000 in estimated cost would be actually undertaken under the present regulation. Colonel Cooper answered that in his judgment no new projects could be financed unless the regulations were liberalized.

STOCK SHOW TO BE BIG

A meeting of the Union Stock Show Association was held last night at Union and it was decided that the races and other sports this year will be the equal of any other year, and present indications are that the premium list will be about double that of other years. No announcement regarding the premiums will be made until the various breeders' associations have notified the directors as to the amount they will offer.

The Shorthorn breeders have, it is understood, already assured the association that they will give \$500 if the association will put in \$500 for premiums in the Shorthorn classes. The meeting last night was pronounced the liveliest meeting ever held by the association.
