Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Graham were tendered a farewell reception at the rooms of the La Grande athletic club last night.

At a meeting of Rescue Hose company, No. 1, this week, Chief Daily was presented with a handsome watch charm as a token of esteem. The charm consisted of a large cougar's claw, neatly polished and trimmed with gold.

La Grande's amateur theatrical company will appear before the public on December 29, in an interesting drama entitled "The Commercial Drummer." Following is the cast: John Dally, J. W. ## AUTO PARK IS NOW OPEN

SEVERAL PARTIES NOW CAMPED AT THE CITY PARK

New Park at Old Fair Grounds May Be Used This Season—Action Expected Next Week.

Although no permanent auto park has been built here, the city park is again being pressed into service by tourist parties. Several parties are camping there now and the number of tourists seems to be rapidly increasing as the warm weather approaches. The new park, which will be at the old fair grounds, may be in use before the end of the summer, but at present no facilities to care for the tourists have been provided.

The matter of the permanent park is expected to be settled at next week's meeting of the city commission. At that time a resolution will probably be introduced to vacate Q avenue from the east line of North Maple to the north line of the O-W, right of way, and to vacate North Maple from the south line of Q avenue to the north line of the O-W, right of way.

The property on Q avenue now belongs to the U. S. National bank and this piece of property would be transferred to the city while the city would transfer the property on Maple to the U. S. National Bank.

By this arrangement the city will have a considerably larger piece of land for its park, while the bank will get a piece of property which is expected to be as valuable as that it

gives up and adjoining its other property.

Later in the summer trees will be planted and facilities for taking care of tourists will be installed. While it will be a year before the park will be in as desirable shape as might be wished, tourists will have a comfortable place to camp without having to go out of the city.

The park at Union, which will be among the finest in the state when completed, will not be finished for some time. Several tourists have stopped there this week but local auto men believe that many tourists will prefer La Grande for camping because La Grande has more attractions to offer.
