TEACHER SUPPLY INSUFFICIENT

The convention of the Inland Empire Teachers' association held last week was declared to have been the best convention of that association held during the past seven years by A. C. Hampton, superintendent of the La Grande schools, who has attended every convention of the association in that time.

Of particular interest to Oregon was the conference of Oregon superintendents and principals held last Wednesday afternoon. State Superintendent J. A. Churchill was chairman of this meeting. It was brought out during the afternoon that in no instance had teachers been employed for the coming year at lower salaries than paid during the current year and in many cases salaries have been raised.

It was the unanimous sentiment of those at this meeting that there is no surplus of trained teachers and most of those present stated that the number of applicants of training and sufficient experience was not sufficient this year.

Among the important addresses made was that of Professor Charles A. Prosser, president of the Duwoody Institute in Minneapolis, who is recognized as one of the highest authorities on vocational training in the United States.

Dr. A. Upham, new president of the University of Idaho, also delivered an address that was declared by Mr. Hampton to have been among the masterpieces of the convention.

There were upwards of 2500 teachers in attendance and every one of the four states comprising the association, Montana, Idaho, Oregon and Washington, was well represented. Superintendent Orville C. Pratt, of Spokane, who is president of the association, presided, and also read a paper on the problems of school finance that was considered exceptionally thorough.
