Only Four Attendance for Show—

D. W. Griffith's "Way Down East" carrying its own orchestra appeared at the Arcade yesterday afternoon and last night and was greeted with fair-sized audiences. It is evidently a combination of features from "Uncle Josh," "East Lynne" and "Uncle Tom's Cabin" wound into an interesting plot. It would seem that the old play "Uncle Josh" has prompted the rural and barn dance scenes, while Eliza crossing the ice in Uncle Tom's Cabin may have inspired the ice scene and, unquestionably, "East Lynne" has fitted the play with its plot including the villain, Francis Levison, who in this instance is Lennox Sanderson. The story it teaches is more or less true, but some of the scenes, in order to get the point intended well established has caused Mr. Griffith to go just a little farther in his drama than most censors should permit. It is a beautiful piece of photography, several sections of the film showing colored work that is quite artistic. Coming, as it does, as one of the first melodramas in pictures to command the spoken drama prices, it might be called the pioneer runner for this class of entertainment. It will be shown this evening at the Arcade, which is the last opportunity afforded to see it in La Grande.
