TROUBLE BREWS ON HIGHWAYS

PEOPLE OF DURKEE ARE AL-
MOST UP IN ARMS.

Contract Is Said to Have Been Let at
Too Low A Price—Work Is Dan-
gerous to the Public.

BAKER, Apr. 5.—"Trouble is brewing for someone in relation to the methods adopted by the firm of Copenhagen-Brothers, contractors of the Nelson-Huntington section of the Old Oregon Trail," says the Baker Herald and further states that "The people of Durkee are almost up in arms over the entire situation."

"If the first place the contract was let at too low a figure, being far under the bid of all other reliable firms. The highway commission should be censured for allowing a firm to go on against an assured loss, for trouble can only result."

"Charges that this firm has not paid their bills promptly when promised are being made. Also that through their systems of piecemeal sub-contracting, they are securing much work for nothing as the sub-contractors soon find that they are playing a losing game and quit. Small wages are being paid and large numbers of Greeks and Mexicans are being secured. It is said that it takes three days to keep the work going."

one on the way, one on the job, and one leaving.
"But even these charges are not the worst. While part of this may be due to sub-contractors, nevertheless the Copenhagen-Brothers are responsible for what is going on. Tourists report that no signs have directed them to the detour through Rye Valley and after going several miles over bad road are forced to turn back needlessly. The road is needlessly blocked in places preventing necessary travel to and from points on the highway and interfering with the delivery of mail.

One man reports that a big lumber was left in the middle of the road and he was told to move it himself if he wanted by. Another man reports that indiscriminate blasting is fired without warning and one charge exploded within a few yards of a rig without any sign or word of warning having been given."

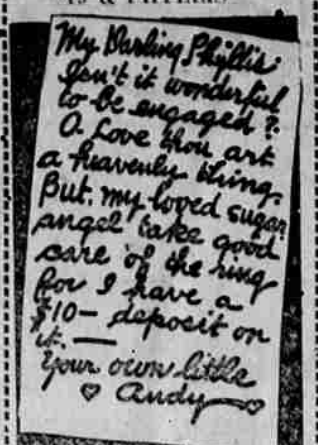
