**Returns From California**—Mrs. Terrence Brandon Hogan has returned from Southern California, where she was called to attend the funeral of Cyril Dudley, the sixteen-year-old Santa Clara student who died as a result of injuries received in a football game. The lad was laid to rest in Mt. Calvary cemetery, at San Jose, California, by the side of his mother whom he lost in childhood. The funeral was one of the largest ever held in the city, over 300 autos forming the funeral cortege.

**Campers May Have to Pay**—A strong probability that tourists who are guests of Pendleton during this summer vacation season will be required to pay a nominal fee for the use of firewood on the tourists' camping grounds was expressed at the meeting of the city council. Councilman Simpson reported that he had just recently made an inspection of the methods followed at Walla Walla where such a practice is followed. It was shown in an informal report that the item of wood alone cost the city \$200 last year in the month when the Round-Up was held. No definite action was taken last night.—Pendleton East Oregonian.

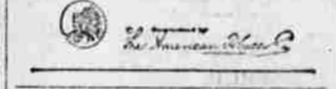

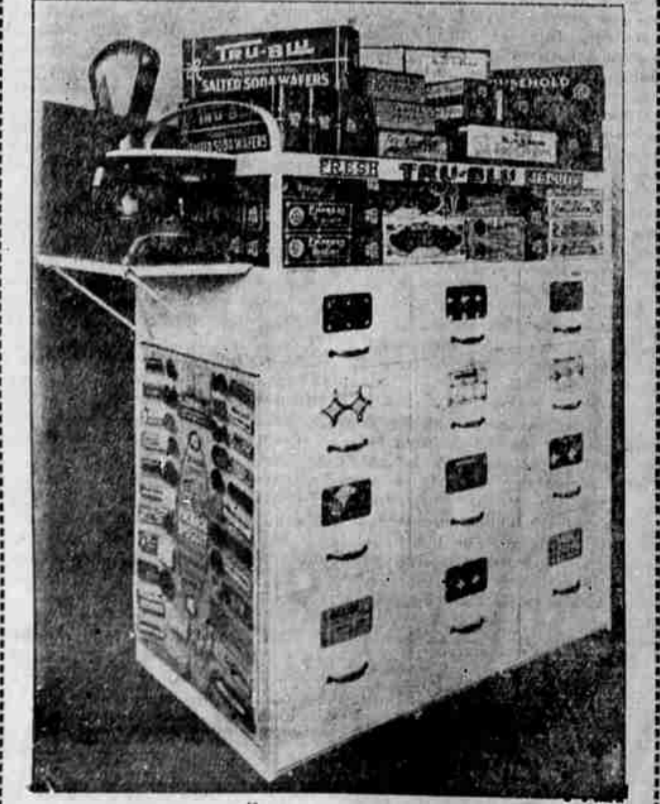
