Permit for Garage—

A building permit for a garage to cost \$1100 was issued by the city recorder's office today. The garage will be built by Herman Siegrist in rear of his residence on Fourth street, between Adams and Washington, and will have room for four cars.

Town Indicted for Road Neglect—

The town of Reading, Mass., has been indicted on a charge of criminal neglect in failing to maintain a highway in a proper manner. The Middlesex county (Mass.) grand jury brought the indictment. The town was indicted under a statute that provides that a city or town must keep its highways reasonably safe and convenient for public travel.

Insure Against Car Seizure—

Decisions of the Federal courts that automobiles carrying liquor or drugs could be seized and sold, which for a time threatened the contract sales business of the motor car industry, have been met by insurance companies. Now when a car is sold on the installment plan in Los Angeles, Cal., the dealer making the sale requires insurance against fire, theft and carrying of drugs or liquor. The rate of premium is said to be very small.

Tractors vs. Horses—

An incident where three tractors helped to save a large quantity of wheat occurred recently at Floydada, Texas, where a granary containing 1,160 bushels of wheat burst during a rainstorm, necessitating the removal of the wheat regardless of road conditions. Six hundred bushels were hauled to shelter in the town by the three tractors and 500 bushels were hauled by twenty horses, all over roads considered impassable with heavy loads. The tractors out-traveled the horses and made the trip of sixteen miles in four and one-half hours with only an occasional stop to clean the tires. The average load hauled by each tractor was 16,000 pounds.

ALL LOST SIGHT IN THE WAR

Members of Evergreen Post, No. 5, American Legion, Eulogized by National Commander.

The spirit of the American Legion does not lag in the members of Evergreen post, No. 5, in spite of the fact that all of its members are men who lost their sight during the World war.

When F. W. Gallbraith, Jr., national commander, heard of the formation of the post recently, he immediately wrote a letter to Charles Frear, post commander. Mr. Gallbraith intends to visit the post in the near future. The national commander's letter, in part, follows:

"I am touched beyond expression that these comrades of ours have seen fit to associate themselves together in affiliation with the great American Legion for the purpose of realizing more fully those ideals for which they fought. It is an inspiration to know that to them there would be no further obligation to give to the world, but rather to live and receive, they still feel a desire to give something further of service to their country and community. This is indeed true nobility."

LEGION OFFICER IN MEXICO

Commander of Department Also Member of National Executive Committee of the Legion.

Although Leigh H. Rozar, commander of the department of Mexico of the American Legion was president of a large brokerage firm in Mexico City, Mexico, at the start of the World war, he enlisted in the army early in the game.

Mr. Rozar commanded a battery of field artillery as first lieutenant and upon promotion to a captaincy, served in the Thirty-third field artillery, remaining with that organization during its service overseas. He was discharged from service at the Walter Reed hospital in Washington, D. C., June 10, 1919, and returned to his home in Mexico City.

An organizer of Alan Seeger post of the Legion at Mexico City, Mr. Rozar was named as its first commander. He was recently elected commander of his department and a member of the national executive committee of the Legion.

IS PIONEER LEGION WORKER

Washington Man, Field Organizer, Will Help Supervise National Movement for More Members.

Robert A. Le Roux, who was one of the pioneer American Legion workers in the state of Washington, has been appointed field organizer at national headquarters, and left recently for Nevada to begin work there.

Mr. Le Roux is a newspaper man and has had considerable experience in the field of organization. He served with a Canadian infantry unit in France during the war. He is one of several national field organizers whose duty it will be to supervise speakers and other organizers in the national movement for more members for the American Legion. The membership campaign to be carried out this year will be national in scope.

MOVIE REVEALS BOLL WEEVIL AS VILLAIN

Two-Reel Film Shows Activities of Little Insect.

Calcium Arsenate Plays Important Part in Destroying Pest and Saving Southern Farmers Thousands of Dollars Annually.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

"Goodbye, Boll Weevil," is the title of an entertaining and instructive two-reel film just released by the United States Department of Agriculture. Mr. Boll Weevil, destroyer of American crops to the extent of many million dollars a year, is the "heavy" villain. He appears several times individually in the course of this lively production, but the principal part is devoted to the activities of the hero of the sketch, Mr. Calcium Arsenate, who is aided and abetted by the department in his efforts to bring about

Mr. Weevil's overthrow, "Boll" depends upon Mr. Weevil from a battery of horse-drawn machines, of which 40 are shown in one spectacular scene taken in early summer. Work is shown in the department's laboratories at Tullahoma, La., and in Washington, D. C., where the methods which save cotton planters \$20,000,000 or more annually were devised.

One interesting feature is the laboratory work by which bugs, weevil exterminators are detected. The second part of the film, taken in the fall, shows thousands of acres of snowy cotton fields with pickers gathering the snowy bolls. Two or three cotton bolls are shown between fields where calcium arsenate dust has been applied and adjoining rows which are neglected. From actual experience the saving to the 5,000-acre plant is given at more than \$44 an acre. The film is designed primarily for demonstration work in the South and is one of about 500 films covering more than 100 subjects showing different phases of the work of the department. Copies of the film may be bought from the department by institutions and organizations interested in boll weevil extermination. It is suggested for state agricultural colleges, houses of commerce, etc.

MOVING OF POLES HOLDS UP WORK ON VICTORY WAY

Within a week after the electric light poles along the proposed Victory Way route have been moved, work on the road will begin, according to a statement by County Roadmaster John F. Birney and City Manager George Garrett.

The city has already spent \$205.75 in hauling dirt that will be needed for filling in. No additional dirt will have to be hauled as the high spots will furnish sufficient dirt when the grading is done.

The excavating, hauling and dumping of this dirt cost 62 cents a yard, 324 yards being hauled. This is considered a very low figure for this work as if the city had contracted the work it would probably have cost a dollar a yard.

No funds were specifically provided for this work and the city used dirt that had to be excavated on other streets and thereby killed two birds with one stone.

Washington's Religion.

The number of hairs in a virgin bow has formerly been 80 to 100 in France; but now it is customary to have the hair ribbon broader, and this, therefore, requires 175 to 200 single hairs. These must be at least 30 inches long. Tourne bestowed great care on the selection of bow-hair, preferring the French horse-hair. A great deal of bow-hair comes from Russian Siberia.
