SUMMER SCHOOL GETS NOTABLES

EUGENE, April 9.—With the announcement that Dr. Horace A. Eaton, head of the department of English at Syracuse university, will teach English on the campus at Eugene, and that twenty-two well-known educators from Eastern and Western institutions, including the University of Oregon, have been secured by Dr. George Rebec, director of the Portland center of the university, strong courses for the summer terms of the university which open June 30 and continue to July 30, seem assured.

Dr. Eaton will give three courses in the campus summer term of the poets and modern drama, and teachers attending the summer term at Eugene will have an opportunity to study English under the instruction of one of the greatest authorities in the country.

Harvard Graduate

Dr. Eaton received his education at Harvard University and before going to Syracuse, taught English at Boston University and the University of Vermont. He is president of the Syracuse drama league, member of the New York regents' board of English examinations, and is a frequent contributor to magazines and journals.

For the Portland summer term Dr. Rebec announces that Dr. Joseph Schafer, superintendent of the Wisconsin Historical society, and author of standard histories of Oregon and the Pacific Northwest, will conduct two courses in history. Dr. Schafer was formerly a member of the faculty of the university at Eugene, serving for several years as head of the history department.

Noted Instructors

Dr. Emilio Goggio, professor of romance languages at the University of Toronto, will offer courses in French at the Portland summer term. Dr. William A. Morris, professor of history at the University of California, will offer two courses in European history; Dr. S. C. Kohn, psychologist of the court of domestic relations will offer two courses in psychology and Professor Charles McKinley of Reed college will have two classes in industrial history.

MARCH BREAKS ALL RECORDS

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN SHOWS GREAT GROWTH.

More Books Loaned During the Past Month Than During Any Other Month Report Says.

The month of March was a record-breaking month for the public library, according to the report submitted to the city commission by Miss Mary A. Nichols Wednesday night. The number of books loaned was 3506, this being 303 over the number loaned during the same month in 1920, the previous record holder.

The number of new borrowers added to the library's list during the month was 101, only 11 of whom are non-residents of La Grande. During the same month of last year only 71 new borrowers were added to the list. A total of 467 new books were placed in circulation by the library during the month, 67 of which were added to the city branch of the library and 400 to the county branch. The addition of another trained librarian has also made it possible to keep the library open longer hours, the hours now being from 10 a. m. to 6 p. m. and from 7 p. m. to 9 p. m. on weekdays, and from 11:30 to 5:30 on Sundays, the reading room only being open on Sundays.

These Nettles Deal Death.

Any species of nettles is unpleasant enough to handle roughly, but some of the foreign ones are most formidable plants. Several of the East Indian forms are truly dangerous, for after the first itching sensation has passed away it is often followed by that of tar being rubbed on the flesh, and the pain increases to such an extent that after hours—and sometimes days—the patient is seized with symptoms like those following influenza and lockjaw, while sometimes death results.

Jesuits Brought Sugar Cane.

Sugar cane was introduced into Louisiana from Santo Domingo by the Jesuits in 1701. The first refined sugar was made by Antonio, Mendoza in 1702, but the first refined sugar on a commercial scale was made in 1704 by Etienne De Bore. The plantations of these two planters now form a part of the city of New Orleans.
