OBJECTIONS TO ROAD ARE OVERCOME

may future date, according to Judge Crawford.

May Issue Warrants

There are two objections that are advanced in explaining the reasons for not building the road now. Judge Crawford pointed out. First, it is contended that the bonds must sell at par. However, the act authorizes the county court, if it sees fit, to issue county warrants at par for any portion of the work. Therefore, this objection is without foundation.

Limitation Is Null

The second objection is the allegation made by the county court, as well as others, that only \$400,000 in bonds can be issued in one year. This contention is also without foundation in law. Judge Crawford pointed out. The act under which the election was held allows the county court to make certain changes in details, providing, however, that these changes are not inconsistent with other provisions of the act. Such an inconsistency exists in the matter of the limitation of the amount of bonds that can be issued in one year.

The county court claims that the bonds already provided for the Klamath and Elgin roads will be over \$400,000 and therefore refuse to provide the means of building the roads from here to Cave.

Most Important Road

"There is not a road in the county that is more important," Judge Crawford said. "It will accommodate more people than any other road that will be built. The \$276,000 provided for this road cannot be used for any other road work. We should compel the county court to do this work this year."

A meeting will be held early next week of the good roads committee of the Ad Club at which Judge Crawford will be present to further advise as to the most feasible procedure to obtain immediate action on the part of the county court.

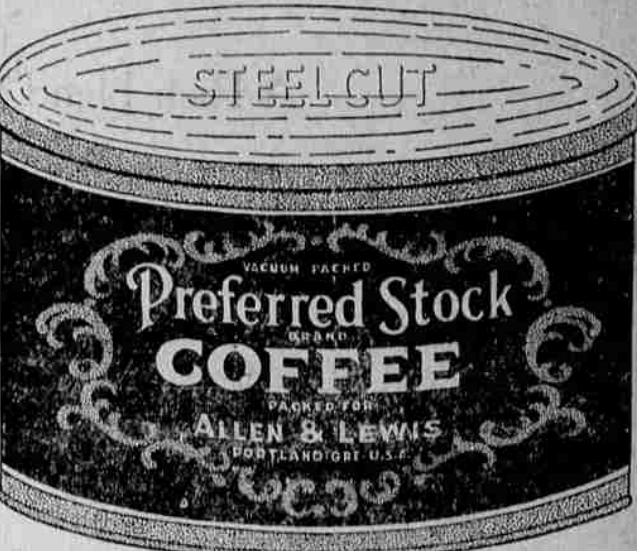
