## LIFE SENTENCE GIVEN BRUNO

CONVICTED OF SECOND DEGREE MURDER OF FRIEND.

Body of Harry I. Pawluk Was Discovered Near Portland On February 22.

PORTLAND, Apr. 14.—John Kawacinski, alias John Bruno, was convicted today of second degree murder for the killing of his friend, Harry I. Pawluk, whose body was found near this city on February 22. The verdict carried with it a sentence of life imprisonment.

The claim of Bruno that he shot his meekmate, Harry I. Pawluk, in self-defense was barred from consideration of the jury by John McCourt, circuit judge, yesterday, when the judge recited Bruno's own story of the killing and instructed the jurors that it did not justify murder, if true.

Final cross-examination of the defendant and argument to the jury occupied most of the day yesterday. At 5:15 the jurors retired to deliberate on the fate of Bruno, who was charged with murder in the first degree. Throughout the trial Bruno, a dapper, polite man of slight build and inoffensive appearance, maintained his composure well, although on a few occasions yesterday tears filled his eyes and his features worked nervously as he sought to restrain himself.

On the stand Bruno declared that he fired the fatal shots at Pawluk when the latter was on the ground, protesting that he had no intention of killing him.

Bruno testified in striking Pawluk with a heavy cane, with the butt of a revolver and to shooting him in the course of the altercation, while his only testimony as to offensive action on the part of Pawluk was that on reaching a lonely spot in the woods near Barnes road Pawluk had cursed him, had drawn a revolver and had clicked the hammer. Bruno said he killed Pawluk with Pawluk's revolver, which he had knocked from the latter's hand.

Early on the night of the killing Bruno testified under cross-examination yesterday. Pawluk wrote two telegrams to be sent for him by Bruno to a Dr. George Dany in San Francisco, one asking for \$100 and the second reading "I have lost all goods. I am departing today for Minneapolis." This was to explain the sending of the telegrams to Dany by Bruno under the name of Pawluk, after Pawluk's death.

**Telegrams Held Ruse.**—Why Pawluk would have drafted those telegrams the night he planned the death of Bruno—if Bruno's story of being lured into the woods by Pawluk were true—was a question asked the jury by Joseph L. Hammerly, deputy district attorney prosecuting the case. He contended that Bruno wrote the first night telegram in an attempt to get the money from Pawluk's friend and the second to cover up the disappearance of Pawluk.

Under cross-examination the deputy district attorney forced the admission from Bruno that he destroyed everything of no value, which might prove a clue to the identity of Pawluk after the killing, but retained in his own possession all of Pawluk's property which was of any intrinsic worth. Though he said he was grief-stricken at the killing of his friend, Bruno testified that he did not examine the body of Pawluk to make certain he was not alive when he rifled his pockets, and said he was not certain that Pawluk was dead when he left him the night of the slaying.

## SINN FEIN SHOE FACTORY RAIDED

DUBLIN, Apr. 14.—Sir Arthur Edward Vicars, former Under King-of-arms, was shot dead today at Lis-towel, and his residence burned. Five policemen were ambushed last night at Fedamore, county of Limerick. One was killed and three wounded. A Sinn Fein shoe factory here was used as an assembling place for bombs and was raided. Two persons in it were arrested.

## I. W. W. MUST SERVE TERM

OLYMPIA, Wash., Apr. 14.—The state supreme court today upheld the conviction of seven of the alleged I. W. W. members convicted of second degree murder in connection with the Centralia armistice day killings. The court refused to grant a new trial. The men will be transferred from the Montesano county jail to the state prison to begin serving their sentence of from twenty-five to forty years.

## DEMAND MADE FOR CLEAN-UP IN SALES TAX

a year. On the big incomes from \$80,000 a year upward, the income and surtax are, roughly, from 20 to 70 per cent. It is on these big incomes that it is proposed to make the reductions, so that the highest rate paid by anybody will be 40 per cent.

"The purpose of the reduction on these incomes is not to make things easier for the rich. It is because the rich have found it profitable to put their fortunes wholly or largely into liberty bonds or into state and municipal bonds which are exempt from taxation. That is what President Harding meant by saying these higher taxes are so artificial and burdensome as to defeat their own purposes."

"Now if these larger income taxes and the excess profits taxes are to be repealed and expectation in Washington is universal that they will be the next question is, where shall we get the taxes that formerly we have been getting from those sources?"

"To this question two answers are proposed. One is that the rate of taxation on small incomes shall be increased. This suggestion will strike the army of small income tax payers as startling, but the fact is it is seriously discussed as the alternative in case the sales tax should fail. The other is the new form of taxation called the sales tax or the turnover tax. This tax, in its simpler form, is the form in which Senator Smoot of Utah introduced it—provided for a flat tax of 1 per cent on all goods, wares or merchandise sold."

Even in the simple form to which Senator Smoot has tried to reduce the idea there are several exceptions or exemptions. One is that a merchant or other person whose total gross sales are under \$6000 a year, should be exempt. This would leave most farmers free of this tax. Another exemption is that goods sold for export should not be taxed."
