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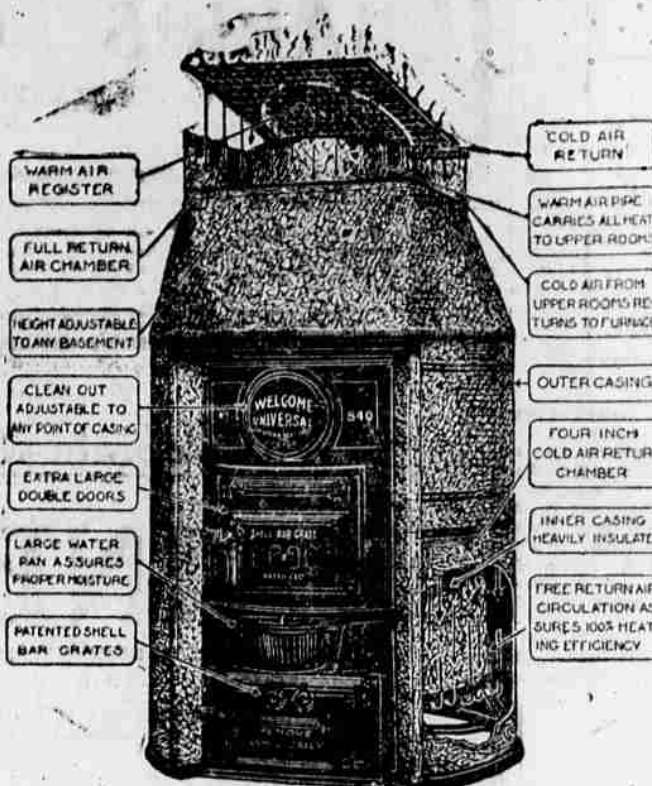

The Milk Goat Industry

Goat Milk for Infants and Invalids.

It is funny that some people, when you talk about goat milk, ask, "why is it good to drink?" Yes, it is good to use for anything you usually use milk for, even for the infants.

Goat's milk is the best substitute for the human milk for infant feeding. It is readily digested, and easy on the digestive organs. Each child differs, so the feeding of one might not be so good for another, so we can only start a guide to go by which may vary according to the conditions to be met. As to differ-
ent ages, a small or young child will use less than an older one, and so on.

Digestive disturbances, pronounced digestive disturbances, nervousness, etc., are the most general with the smaller infants.

Proper Feeding Essential.
Children that seem well, but never develop as they should, or do not take on weight, will always do well on goat's milk. Some infants have trouble with the runs not solid in shape to start with. Doctors will nearly always prescribe fresh goat's milk. Proper feeding of goat's milk with a little experience in each individual case, will generally develop well sized children, that have been naturally small and puny.

It must be definitely brought out in the mind that infants cannot at first receive all of the nutrition which they should have, but only that which their run-down system can handle and properly digest.

Proportions Are Told.
If you should crowd the feeding of these infants, they would not be able to digest but only a small portion, the rest would undergo chemical change which would result in poisoning the system. In feeding young children, they are generally fed as to age, as their stomachs are very small. The stomach grows rapidly as they advance in age, so that the food requires increasing for infants the month of age, 1 ounce goat milk, 1/2 teaspoonful of malt sugar, 1 teaspoonful lime water, 1 to 1 1/2 ounces boiled water, fed

every two hours in daytime, and every four hours in the night.

At two months of age, increase the amount to 2 ounces goat milk, 1 teaspoonful malt sugar, 2 teaspoonfuls lime water, 2 ounces of boiled water, feed about the same, two and four hours. The increase of goat milk is the same as before, with the same of the other milk, increasing one and two ounces over three months of age. Feed three hours in the day and every five hours in the night.

Milk Quickly Digested.
The milk for invalids differs some for the different cases, although as the milk can be digested in about forty minutes, they can generally drink a great amount each day. In some cases, the milk has to be diluted a little, while in other cases, they give the patient all they want, full strength.

Good For Tuberculosis.
Scientists have long claimed that wide spread use of goat's milk would do much toward reducing tuberculosis in children and a practical test of that theory is now in sight. It plans being perfected at the present time, carry the California Tuberculosis Association will establish a goat farm in the mountains where the raising of pure bred milk goats of the Swiss type will supply the colony of patients. It is estimated that there are about 150,000 cases of tuberculosis in that state today.
