The Ice Town—
Trainloads of ice are shipped every year from North Powder, Or. It is a town which goes to extremes in weather, for a summer it is very hot, and in winter, it is very cold. When the big storm struck the Pacific Coast in December, 1919, the temperature at North Powder was 50 degrees below zero, which should be cool enough for an Eskimo. Well, the cold weather is taken advantage of. There is a big artificial lake not far from the railroad and this is flooded. When it freezes the ice is cut and hauled by machinery and the chunks are hoisted upon cars. It is nothing unusual to see a trainload of ice being hauled from North Powder. QUICK WORK IS NEEDED ON S. A. TREATY

of the concession, is to have first call on all the platinum needed, after which the British government is to be supplied before the general public can purchase any platinum. The Colombian government, of course, has prior rights even to those of the United States and Great Britain.

Titles to all lands and riverbeds taken over have been passed on by the highest courts of Colombia, so that there is no possible question of the validity of the transactions. The revolution in Russia has forced all the large operators of that country to suspend work, leaving Colombia the only dependable producer. The normal annual consumption of platinum by the United States alone is double the present production of the entire world. Colombia is expected to recover about 50,000 ounces any year, and most of that has been incidental to the production of other metals. Colombia and Russia have the only important deposits thus far proven.

Adolph Lewisohn, of New York, is president of the South American Gold and Platinum company. Other interests in addition to the Lewisohn Exploration company, of which Frederick Lewisohn is president, are Johnson Mothey & Co., of London, assayers to the British government, and the Consolidated Goldfields company of London. Several important American capitalists are interested as individuals.

Rich in Gold.
These platinum deposits are also rich in gold, and from them there has been taken more than \$200,000,000 of gold since the Spaniards discovered them. The natives had been working them for centuries for gold, but threw the platinum back as they considered it worthless. Platinum has been precious only in the last generation. In 1919 it sold as high as \$170 an ounce, and is now worth about \$75 an ounce. The metal has peculiar chemical properties that made it an absolute necessity in the production of high explosives during the great war. It was at the urgent request of the United States government that Lewisohn pushed their work in Colombia.

The platinum deposits seem to be confined to the headwaters of the San Juan and Atrato rivers. There is one other company at work on the San Juan, in a small way, but the Lewisohn interests have acquired dredging right, the entire length of the San Juan, a distance of more than 200 miles, together with the headwaters of the Atrato and the mineralized tributaries of both rivers. Development work has been proceeding in the last ten years on about 10,000 acres of beds and fifty miles of river bottoms. Two dredges are now at work, producing at the rate of about 20,000 ounces a year. With this additional acquisition the company will have some 400 miles of river beds and bottoms and many thousand additional acres of places ground. It is proposed to add new dredges as rapidly as they can be constructed. A third dredge will be at work on the property before the end of this year. It is expected that twenty or thirty dredges will ultimately be digging in these places. The value of the platinum and gold in the property is roughly estimated at more than \$200,000,000.

Dr. Marco Fidel Suarez, president of Colombia, recently visited the mining headquarters of the company at Andagoya and expressed satisfaction as the work being done there by Americans. The work required the outlay of millions before there could be any production, and native capital to prosecute the work was lacking. Entry of American capital is therefore a matter of considerable importance in developing a section of the country that has been untouched until the platinum industry was developed.

WASHINGTON CODE STRICT

NEW DIVORCE LAWS PASSED BY RECENT LEGISLATURE

Parties Rushing Out of State to Get Married While Decree is Pending Gully of Many

SPOKANE, April 18.—Washington's new divorce code as amended by the last legislature sitting at Olympia, is declared by S. A. Mann, of Spokane, one of the committees which framed the amendments, to be about as strict as those in force in any state in the country.

"After June 1 is will no longer be possible to obtain an absolute decree of divorce following the trial of the case," Judge Mann said. "The new amendment provides that the court, after hearing the case, shall either deny the application for divorce, or after an interlocutory decree, in the interlocutory decrees statements of property rights and of the custody, care and education of children is made and appeal from the interlocutory decree may be made at any time within 90 days after it is entered. "At any time after six months has elapsed from the date of entering the interlocutory decree, the trial judge may, upon motion of either party, enter an order granting a final decree of divorce.

"Parties who rush out of the state and get married while the interlocutory decree is pending and before the final decree is signed, under the new amendments, can be prosecuted for bigamy. After the final decree is signed the six months clause holds good in that state. That means that parties who start divorce proceedings can not hope to marry again in the state until at least 13 months had elapsed from the time of filing the complaint. In most cases it will be more nearly 18 months than 13 months."

In short the new divorce rules are as follows:
Interlocutory decrees signed at conclusion of trial; final decree of divorce not signed until six months after entering the interlocutory decree.

Final decree of divorce cannot be obtained in less than seven months after the filing of the divorce complaint.

The court, in its discretion, may direct prosecution for violation of the "lazy husband" act before entering interlocutory decree.

The creation of a divorce proceeding in the prosecuting attorney of the state who shall be present at all divorce hearings.

All property rights and custody and care of children settled at the time of entering the interlocutory decree.

Appeal may be taken from interlocutory decree, but no appeal can be taken from final decree of divorce.

APPEARANCE CHIEF FACTOR

"Eat you musta squeeza, da fruit squeeza da coconut," a Hoboken fruit vendor admonishes his prospective customers. And Tony was right. No one wants to buy damaged fruit.

The selling value of fresh fruit and vegetable shipments is judged largely on appearance when received, say specialists of the Bureau of Markets, United States Department of Agriculture. Fruit should be well graded or assorted, packed in the most approved manner and shipped when weather and market conditions seem most favorable.

Grading is one of the most important factors in preparation for the market. It is being studied by specialists of the bureau from every angle. Grades, which are optional, have been suggested for a number of commodities, and this work is being continued.

The marketing of the apple crop suggests the value of grading. Apples were not graded the entire crop would have to be disposed of within four months. It is estimated that proper handling has extended the marketing period to seven or eight months. Investigation and experience have both shown that it only pays to ship the best produce. Stock which is not suitable for storage and shipment may be disposed of in the vicinity where grown and the lowest quality should be diverted to by-products factories.

RAILROAD CARRIAGE IN WHICH ARMISTICE WAS SIGNED, TROPHY

PARIS, April 19.—The railway carriage in which the German representatives signed the armistice, with Marshal Foch's consent, to be given a place of honor on the terrace of the Invalides, besides the trophies of the Crimean War. It was originally intended to present the 9th history of the 19th century. The carriage was in the view of its military significance, it should be exhibited at the Invalides.
