EUGENE, Apr. 21.—The Oregon varsity baseball team leaves Eugene today for a northern tour, playing eight games before returning to the campus May 19. Coach George Bohler is in charge of the trip.

The varsity nine meets Washington in a two-game series at Seattle Friday and Saturday. Washington State college furnishes the opposition for two more games on April 25 and 26. Whitman will be played at one game on the following day, winding up the intercollegiate games to be played on the trip.

April 23 the varsity will play a town team at Kennewick, Wash. On April 29 and 30, the varsity will be seen in action on Portland lots, meeting the North Pacific dentists in the first game, and the Multnomah tossers in the final contest before returning to Eugene.

Remaining games on the baseball schedule include: University of Washington at Eugene, May 6 and 7; Washington State college at Eugene May 11 and 12; Oregon Agricultural college at Eugene, May 20 and 21; Oregon Agricultural college at Corvallis, May 27 and 28.
