## News From Surrounding Localities

### LARGE HERDS TAKEN TO RANGE

IOWA SCHOOL DISTRICT, Apr. 21.—(Special.)—A most picturesque sight was presented to the people of the district when about seven hundred horses and cattle of the Summerville Livestock Association passed through on their way to their respective ranges on the Forest Reserve. About noon, on Friday, the fifteenth, the lanes were filled with the slowly moving herd. Over a dozen men were driving, with the help of a number of dogs. The route taken, around by Perry, is a distance of over twenty-five miles. A much shorter drive would have been over the face of Mt. Emily, by the Indian Trail, but the snow lies too deep on the summit to allow it this year.

Because of the slowness with which the cattle must travel, he herders planned to get into the river canyon and there to spend the night, covering the remaining distance the following day. To do away with the necessity of pack horses, food and bedding was carried in a truck. The grass on the reserve is reported as being rather good in spite of the presence of snow. It is expected that it will continue so throughout the summer and that the cattle and horses will be found in good condition at round-up time in the fall.

Iowa school has less than two weeks now of its eight-month term. A community dinner is being planned to celebrate the last day, according to custom. The recent rain has been greeted cheerfully by some whose fields of winter grain had begun to form a hard crust. But, no doubt, some of the farmers are bewailing the delay in seed-bed preparation and planting.

### WILL HOLD BIG ROAD MEETING

COVE, Apr. 21.—(Special.)—A special session of the Farm Bureau at this place on Wednesday was for the purpose of demonstrating gopher poison and was presided over by E. E. Horn, U. S. Agriculturalist, of Portland. County Agent Harry Avery was present and conducted the demonstration. A regular Farm Bureau meeting will be on Friday to discuss fertilizers and the tuberculin test for cattle.

## CREMONA FIRM RECEIVER NAMED

PORTLAND, Apr. 22.—Fletcher Linn, stockholder and creditor of the Cremona Photograph company, was named temporary receiver for the company by Presiding Circuit Judge Kavanaugh.

This step was taken after attorneys for E. N. Wheeler, who is suing the company for \$507 due him for work, told the court that the company was on the verge of insolvency and some step had to be taken to protect investors. The company has assets of \$170,856. It was said, only \$25 of which is in cash. The liabilities were placed at at least \$165,000.

Linn was named as receiver by attorneys for defendant and plaintiff.
