The Rev. G. T. Quinlan and Rev. J. P. Donagan, Paulist Missionaries, will open the two weeks Mission at the 10:30 Mass tomorrow at the Church of Our Lady of the Valley. The evening services will commence at 7:45.

During the first week a short doctrinal instruction will precede the regular Mission sermon. And in one way these instructions will be interesting as the answering of questions, taken from the Question Box during the second week.

These instructions will answer and explain in an interesting way many points of Catholic teaching. Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament will conclude the services each evening.

Following are some of the reasons expressed by Father Quinlan in urging the necessity and benefits of a Mission.

"There is nothing more necessary except the grace of God, than to retire from the whirl of every day life from time to time, and shake the dust of the world from one's clothes and get close to God. Especially, is this true for men and women of our day, when confusion reigns on all sides, upsetting the peace of men's souls. There is real danger in the whirlpool of life that we will become infatuated with its materialisms and weakened in our faith. If we would be able to solve our own individual problems, yes, the great problems of the world, we must get away from the world. This may seem paradoxical, but it is true and always has been true.

"In communion with the spiritual where God speaks to our soul, we will find the solution of difficulties for which we can search in vain amid the false promises of the world. See how helpless were the Statesmen of the world who tried to settle all of their difficulties without the help of God, and ended in making a mess of things."
