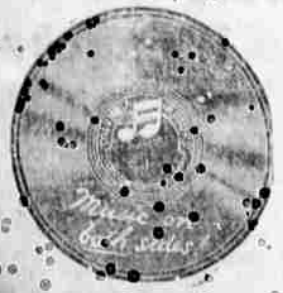

SOLICITING FOR THE BABY HOME

SECRETARY O. B. HENDERSON, OF KERR HOME, IS HERE.

La Grande is Asked to Make Contributions for Furnishing the New Home.

Secretary O. B. Henderson, of the Albertina Kerr Home in Portland, is in La Grande to interest those who care to give to the fund being raised for furnishing this home.

In speaking of his mission here, Mr. Henderson said:

"The Albertina Kerr Nursery, which is situated in Portland, and cares for the homeless, nameless and abandoned babies of Oregon, was a gift of love in the beginning. As such it has thrived as only such gifts can, with a desire to do good for its corner stone. For seven years its doors have never closed against the tiny fists that have knocked for entrance upon its porch. Over a thousand helpless babies have been sheltered within its walls.

"The people throughout the state should have a wide interest in this nursery for the reason that two-thirds of the babies cared for come from outside of Multnomah county. 137 little ones were cared for last year; 58 came from Multnomah county.

"A beautiful new home for these babies stands at East 22nd and Sandy boulevard in Portland, a lasting monument to the child-loving people of Oregon. Ten thousand dollars more is needed to furnish the building and make it habitable for its small guests.

"Twenty thousand dollars was the amount needed to finish and furnish the new nursery. Five thousand dollars of this was voted at the last legislature, about \$5,000 has been contributed by drives and Tag Days, \$10,000 more is needed and must come from towns and cities who have held no drive for the nursery this year. The Community Chest of Portland cannot provide for buildings or furnishings.

"La Grande is to have her opportunity to do something for this cause on Saturday, April 30, when a "Have a Heart" Tag Day will be held.

"The Boy Scouts will have charge of outdoor advertising, Campfire girls, Girls' Friendly society and girls from the various Sunday schools will lend their aid in selling tags. Mrs. Fred Schilke, Mrs. R. A. Pratt, Mrs. Harriet McDonald, Mrs. Frank Jester and Mrs. L. Dunn, representing the Neighborhood Club; Miss Sarah Smith, the Campfire girls; Miss Lois Gunn, the Girls' Friendly Society, and Mrs. Sherwood Williams and Mrs. J. D. Kimmel, representing the Parent-Teacher associations will conduct the tag day effort. Information or volunteer services for one day may be had by calling Black 332 or from the president of the Parent-Teachers association of your district."
