Support Suit Decided
Judge Knowles has filed a written opinion in the suit filed by Frank Reinhoff against J. H. Blumenstein to recover several parcels of land deed by Reinhoff several years ago to his niece. Blumenstein later married the niece, and several months following the death of the niece, Reinhoff left the family home and brought the suit, claiming that the land was deeded in consideration of support and also on a promise not to marry, and that when the niece died, he was entitled to have the land back. Mr. Reinhoff also claimed that he had been harshly treated by Blumenstein. Judge Knowles did not uphold either party in full, but decided that Blumenstein had established his claim.

However, the Judge did order that a lien be held against the land to the amount of \$500 per month, for the support of Mr. Reinhoff during his lifetime.
