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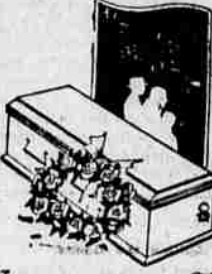

Oregon Unions Progressing—Unions of La Grande, Baker, Pendleton and other eastern Oregon cities are making good progress, according to C. M. Ryerson, editor of the Oregon Labor Press, who reported to the Central Labor Council last night on the trip he took through that section of the state recently. Mr. Ryerson called attention to results obtained by the La Grande Central Labor council which co-operated with the chamber of commerce of that city in prevailing upon a highway contractor to employ American citizens instead of bringing in forty Austrians on a contract.—Portland Telegram.

Three Tourists Get Over Hill—Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Winter and Mr. and Mrs. A. N. Smith motored to Meacham and back Monday and report a variety of roads between here and there. They report that the road from where to Dead Man's hill is in good condition, and that they were able to go from the latter point to Parker's Well, within eight miles of Meacham, without chains. From Parker's Well on to Meacham they found the roads all but impassable. Three inches of snow was found on the top of Cabbage hill and this extended all the way to Meacham on the trip eastward but had mostly disappeared when they made the return trip. The party made the trip and back in seven hours, running time. While they passed three machines of tourists from Iowa who had succeeded in coming over the Old Oregon trail from La Grande the local party's opinion is that it will be at least two weeks longer before the mountain pass can be made with any degree of ease.—Pendleton Tribune.

PHILOSOPHY OF PRAYER SHOWN

Those who attend the Mission at the Catholic church each evening at 7:45 are bringing others with them. The crowd is steadily growing and the increase is the best proof that the sermons are good.

In the instruction last evening Father Quinn spoke on the philosophy of prayer. He showed man's need of prayer for himself and as a mark of his worship of God. "Prayer satisfies the craving of the heart for communion with God. Prayer should be humble, sincere and perfectly submissive to God's will. Remember that we pray to please God; we ask favors but we leave the answer in the hand of God. As Christ Himself, so do we pray. 'Not My will, but Thine be done.'"

Father Donegan delivered a timely and forcible sermon on "The Unwelcome Guest." A man is struck down and killed by an auto or a street car, a child drowns in a tub of water under the very eyes of a mother, one young, hale and hearty, drops in the street unconscious and dies within a few hours. The accidental death is very common. How can you be sure it will not be yours? The great trouble with us is that we will not believe in a sudden death because we never picture such a death for ourselves. "No man knoweth the day nor the hour."

"Such being the uncertainty of the time of death it behooves us all to be always ready so that death may not find us unprepared. Live a good life if you wish to die a good death for life and death are one. Life is a stream which ends in death. Death is but the finishing touch to a picture without which the picture would be incomplete. What if that picture portrays a life of sin, a life at variance with the laws of God? Will the finishing touch be any different? As a man lives, so shall he die. Yes, there are some death bed repentances—the good thief was pardoned by Christ a few hours before he died; but do not forget that the bad thief continued right on to his destruction."

"There are times in the life of every man with his natural likes and dislikes, that there come to him in the guise of persons, events, things or even thoughts what might be called unwelcome guests. Very few if any escape them. Sometimes not even a day passes during which a man is not met by these visitors which fill him with apprehension and loathing, and find no responsive reception from him. But these are to all men at all times the 'Un-

welcome Guest'—aye, even the very thought of it is banished from his thoughts.

Life is the message, the sentence of death! I stand for God! He it is who bids me to pronounce that sentence upon every one of you. "Dust thou art and unto dust shalt thou return."
