formances.

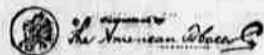

PENDLETON MEN IN READINESS

PENDLETON, Apr. 28.—Local peo-
ple will have their first opportunity
of seeing this year's high school track
team in action next Saturday when
the La Grande high school team will
journey here for a dual meet with
the local squad to be held on the Round-
Up park track and field. This will be
the first major meet for both teams
and will probably be the only one held
in Pendleton this spring.

The meet promises to be a close one
from beginning to end. The Union
county city team is said to be the
strongest put out there for several
years, with a number of veterans who
are sure point winners in their events.
The strength of Coach Hanley's squad
is largely problematical, due to the
fact that it is made up to a large ex-
tent of men who will be getting their
baptism of fire Saturday. The local
athletes, although hampered by the
inclement weather of the past several
weeks, have been training diligently
and promise to be in good early sea-
son form by Saturday.

John Saunders, veteran of past
meets, will take the brunt of the work
for the local team. He will be entered
in the 50-yard dash, 100-yard, pole
vault, high jump, broad jump and 220-
yard dash. Carmen Saunders, his
brother, is also entered in a number
of events, the pole vault, 120-yard,
high hurdles, high jump, 220 low hur-
dles. Both will run on the relay team.
The two Warner brothers will also be
called upon to do a good share of the
work, Lawrence being entered in the
shot put, 100-yard dash, 220-yard dash
discus, 440, and relay, and Byron, the
120-yard high hurdles, 220 low hur-
dles and relay.

Earnheart, Lawrence, Rigby, Hun-
ter and Cole will care for the middle
distance and miles runs, the first two
being entered in both the quarter and
half mile events, the latter three en-
tered in the mile. Rigby will also run
the half mile.

Bill Kramer is entered in the shot
put, discus and javelin events.
