CHAIRMAN BENSON DECLARES CONDITIONS WARRANT REDUCTION

WASHINGTON, Apr. 27.—Sharp differences in opinion as to the wage reductions between Chairman Benson of the shipping board and the spokesman for the marine workers, developed at the opening yesterday of the conference called by Chairman Benson in an effort to avert the threatened strike on May 1. Andrew Fur-

useth, president of the international seamen's union, and other spokesmen for the workers, declared that the fifteen per cent reduction declared by Rear Admiral Benson as necessary, was unacceptable to the unions. Chairman Benson said the present economic conditions fully warranted the reduction of the wages of the marines.

FARMERS ARE STORING EGGS

LOW PRICE OF EGGS SENDS THEM TO STORAGE.

Poultry Producers' Association Is Buying Feed At A Saving and Has Made Storage Provisions.

Poultry producers belonging to the recently organized Eastern Oregon Poultry Producers' association are now putting eggs into storage at the Blue Mountain Creamery, arrangements for storage space having been made there. Prices in all parts of the country are low now and many members of the association are taking advantage of this condition to hold the eggs produced now.

At present the retail price is 27 cents in La Grande, wholesale being 20 cents. In Cove, eggs are only bringing 15 cents, while in Union 17 cents is being paid wholesale and 20 cents retail.

Arrangements have also been made by the association for buying feed at a price which means a considerable saving over the retail price paid by individual members in the past.
