LOCAL LADS ARE LOSERS

PENDLETON THUMB HIGH SCHOOL SATURDAY

Inclement Weather of Past Two Weeks Cause of Defeat of Team in First Important Meet

Neither Coach Earl Reynolds nor the members of the La Grande track team are discouraged over the defeat at Pendleton last Saturday the score being 51 to 31 in favor of the "Hud-Up" city lads. The Pendleton coach admitted that the weather has been fine over there during the past two weeks and this is the reason why they were in such good shape when compared to La Grande. With weather continuing good for a week the local team should make a bid into the hopes of Baker Saturday when the local team meets the Baker lads here.

Christiansen, of La Grande, was one of the chief mainstays of the local team, was out of the races Saturday because of a sprained ankle and this alone gave Pendleton some points because he was picked for a winner in several events.

Start Off Even
The teams were nip and tuck during the first few events, with but a point or two separating them and wisecracks were predicting that the relay would be the deciding event.

John Sanders was high point winner of the meet with 19 points, closely followed by Lawrence Warner with 14 and Byron Warner with 12. Lawrence took nine, Kramer and Snyder eight points, Earnheart six and La Hue six points. These points are exclusive of the relay race won by B. Warner, L. Warner, Snyder and Sanders. Carmen Saunders, a sure point winner in several events, was unable to compete due to illness.

440 is Thriller
The 440 yard race was the most thrilling of the afternoon. Lawrence Warner, Lawrence and Earnheart, grabbed all three places for Pendleton. Warner breaking the tape after a grilling 220 yard sprint. This was considered to be one of La Grande's strongest events but Larsen, the blue and white mainstay, took fourth. Time in this event was 54.4 seconds, very good for high school time, and equals the Pendleton high school record in this event established by Emil Stehert in 1916.

The mile run proves exciting and the time, 5:06.2, was good, especially for this time of the season. At the Eastern Oregon meet last year 5:19 was the time in this event. Bokland, of La Grande, broke the tape a few inches ahead of Hunter of Pendleton, after a neck and neck sprint for 220 yards and Kingwell, also a Pendleton boy was third.

La Grande in Poor Shape.
La Grande plainly showed the need of training and was not in the condition that the past month's practice has attained for the Pendleton meet. Bokland, first in the mile and third in the 800, was the high point man for La Grande, with Bean, winner of the shot put, tied with Larson for second. Tise Larson failed to live up to his reputation and garnered but third in the 220 yard dash, third in the discus and second in the 100, while Theison, another big pin of the La Grander, took second in the broad jump as his points.
