MANY HEAR FATHER QUINAN

FIRST OF WEEK'S SERIES OF LECTURES LAST NIGHT.
"What We Believe" is Subject Discussed by Rev. G. F. Quinan, C. S. P., Last Night.
With all seats occupied, the first lecture of a series to continue nightly this week and closing next Sunday night, for non-Catholics and Catholics was given at the Catholic church last night by the Rev. Guy F. Quinan.
The Rev. Quinan lectured on "Does It Make Any Difference What We Believe?" and said in part:
"This lecture brings us face to face with the most popular religion of the 20th century, the religion of indifference, and yet not a religion, but ferretism, and yet not a religion, but truth the world has ever known."
"The assertion that one religion is as good as another is evidently a self-contradiction. It is a first principle of reason that two contradictory statements cannot both be true at one and the same time. If one is true, the other must be false. To say all of the churches which hold contradictory doctrines are all equally true is to deny objective truth altogether. God is the essential, eternal and absolute truth. Of necessity, he must hate error and falsehood and love truth and wish us to accept it. To assert, therefore, that God does not care what a man believes is nothing short of blasphemy."
"It is, therefore, the first duty of a rational man to love truth, and to embrace it at the cost of any sacrifice. One who says that it does not make any difference what a man believes is tempted to adopt its logical conclusion and say 'it makes no difference what a man does.'"
"Objects of the Mission.
In giving their lectures, the Paulist Fathers stake as a basis that there is an antagonism to the Catholic Faith in the United States today, it does not arise from ill will on the part of those who are on the outside of the church, but from misunderstandings and misconceptions of its teachings; that there is prejudice against the church, it is not a calculated and self-willed prejudice but proceeds rather from a want of clear knowledge of her claims. Animated by this charitable spirit, they do not invite or seek controversy, but simply explain what Catholics believe, and why they believe it."
An interesting and instructive feature of the evening sermon will be the answering of questions concerning the Catholic church. A question box is placed at the entrance of the church and into it the general public is invited to drop any question concerning the Catholic church. These are to be written legibly. Place each question on a separate piece of paper; they will require no signature. Each evening these questions will be answered before the lecture.
You are very kindly invited to come and hear what the oldest church has to say for herself. Do not condemn her unheard. If you come in the spirit of Christ, you will find her the great upholder of the rights of God and man.
The subject for tonight is "The Catholic Church and The Bible."
