THE HOME GARDEN

What is Home without a Garden?

A Blossom Veined With Gold

Of all the early grown garden annuals, the salpiglossis or painted tongue, as it is sometimes called, is one of the most beautiful in its rich and peculiar coloring. Nearly all of the flowers, ranging through royal purple, maroon, orange, yellow, and brown shades, are beautifully marbled and veined, and it has the peculiarity, rare among flowers, of showing fillets of gold in its coloring, rose and gold, scarlet and gold, purple and white and gold, being some of the combinations. The newer varieties have been improved in size and coloring so that they are hardly recognizable in comparison with the old varieties.

It has become a popular cut flower for summer use during the last year or two. It should be planted indoors to get an early start and prolong the season of bloom.

The salpiglossis is a near relative of the petunia and the same culture will succeed with it. Strangely enough with its beautiful coloring it is not nearly as well known as it should be.

It should not be placed in the open ground until the weather is well settled. Like the petunia it seems to delight in hot summers, provided only it is not allowed to become too dry. It is a most reliable bloomer and makes beautiful beds in the annual border or garden, or fine specimen plants here and there as a filler in the hardy borders.

Mignonette

No garden is quite complete without at least a small clump of mignonette, the most fragrant, easily grown garden annual. But there is some trick in getting mignonette going. It is one of the few annuals that resents transplanting, and if anybody tries to do any considerable job of transplanting mignonette, the plants are lifted with enough earth about the roots so that they are practically undisturbed, a large percentage of the plants are likely to die.

Sow the seeds thinly where it is wanted and thin to about six inches apart. If early plants are needed, it is best to grow the seed in small pots, dropping two or three seeds in the center of the pot and then pulling all but one and allowing it to grow until time to transplant it into permanent quarters, when it may be turned out of the pot very readily without even knowing it has been removed.

The paper pots which are on sale at all seed stores are ideal for this sort of work, cheap, and unfolding from around the plant with no danger of disturbing them as it is sometimes necessary when turning them out of an earthen pot.

The High Jump

In this event, as in other field events, the importance of form cannot be over-emphasized. An athlete may have all the necessary natural qualifications, yet if he does not know which form is best adapted for his particular style he will not be able to jump very high. The legs are not used alone to obtain height. The arms, shoulders, chest, and in fact every muscle in the body is used at some particular point in the jump. The most natural jump to use is the "scissors" jump and is used by most school boys. If a man wishes to make any kind of showing, this highest point the hips are drawn in form should not be tried at all. There are several other forms to use that will be far more satisfactory.

According to build and natural form of the jumper, no two men can use exactly the same form with the same degree of success, so the jumper will have to study the form on part of form best suited to himself. The one used by many light, delicate champions and which can be used as a working basis for the other forms will probably be met with success by the majority of high jumpers.

Presuming that the jumper takes off the right foot, the athlete runs from a little to the left, and as the bar is approached, a slight change is made just before the right foot

is planted for the spring. The left leg is thrown up with a great deal of force added by an upward swing of the arm. On leaving the ground a slow turn is made, the right leg is hooked or cut over the bar at the same time, making a quick turn and jerking the hip out of the way and land in the pit facing the take-off. The higher the bar the more layout is necessary.

Another form is the shoot. The jumper runs straight to the bar as in the broad jump. On rising he turns parallel to the bar with his knees drawn up, and when at the highest point the hips are drawn in and out of the way by straightening the legs. Another form which is very successful to those that have mastered it is that of starting from the side as in the scissor style and taking off on the inside foot. The left leg is thrown high with the toe pointed inward or toward the bar. The body should be parallel with the bar, the right leg drawn under and turned. The shoulder should be the lowest point of the body at the top of the jump—in such a position as were the jumper lying on it. The turn is made as in rolling off the bar. This is a very complicated form of jumping and one which, I should say, is more of an acrobatic feat than a jump and is not adapted for every jumper.

whether such tariff be imposed upon a specific or an ad valorem basis, and we urge that to elusive shifting of rate schedules or other methods be employed to obscure this general principle.

"We recognize that it is arriving at a fair measure of protection, the difference in cost of production between this and foreign competing countries, must be the primary factor in the price."

New Point Raised

"In arguing at the American Farm Bureau that the cost of food and other farm products, we demand an hourly wage basis for the farmer and his help that will compare with the hourly wage of equally skilled labor in manufacturing and other industries."

"We further call attention to the important and differing factor that must be considered affecting food products from the American farmer in their relationship to imports of like products from foreign countries."

"Our center of production from the farm of food products is somewhere in the Mississippi valley, while our center of consumption is far to the west, many hundreds of miles away from the center of production."

"Our rates from commercial shippers are so much lower than our own rates for the same commodities that we are forced to consider the possibility of a tariff on the products of the Mississippi valley."

Sales Tax Opposed

"Agriculture neither asks nor demands any special favor in the revision of the tariff, and will take no unfair discrimination, but will support the benefit of other branches of industry."

"The committee highly commended the action of the president's message in which he said: 'The country does not expect nor will it approve a shifting of tax burdens.' The committee recognizes very little value in the great amount of propaganda that has been carried on during the last year from the shifting of taxation from income to consumption tax and believes it economically unsound, socially unjust and governmentally inexpedient."

"The general sales tax would shift the burden of taxation from income and excess profits to a tax on fundamentals, such as food, fuel, clothing and shelter."

"A strong effort has been made to repeal the excess profit tax, but a better way for raising an equal amount of revenue has been found the federation opposes its repeal."

Farmer Needs Aid

"More than \$16,000,000,000 in securities now escape a federal tax. The federation recommends to Congress that it submit to the several states a constitutional amendment prohibiting the issue of all tax free securities."

"Recent experience has demonstrated that the farmer is not being adequately financed through our present system. When he avails himself of the present short time commercial credit he jeopardizes his welfare. To improve this situation the American Farm Bureau Federation urges legislation which will provide the proper authorization for commodity financing based upon warehouse receipts also for cattle financing based upon the proper pledge and for permanent credits secured by the proper collateral features. It also asks that the profits derived from revolving credit be used to provide

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working capital during the interim between the time when requests for money are received and the sale of the debentures. It is suggested that these debentures be made eligible for sale in federal reserve banks or on the open market. It is also suggested that the federal reserve bank be given proper authorization to classify its discounts that primary production may be given adequate consideration. The federation recommends legislation which will make it possible for the federal farm loans bank to increase its maximum loan from \$10,000 to \$25,000 and to require that the primary banks to a federal reserve bank.

"Phone Increases Hit. A committee has been appointed to co-operate with the Washington office of the federation in making a careful study, getting data, securing the advice of experts and formulating such a measure as will meet the financial needs of agriculture is outlined in these resolutions."

"Since it is represented that various public utility corporations such as the American Telephone & Telegraph company by use of subsidiary corporations are enabled to secure from the public, where subsidiary corporations operate, excessive charges for service in such a manner that the public service commission is unable properly to regulate rates, we recommend that our attorney be instructed to take such action in all cases as in his opinion will secure relief for members of the farm bureau and the public generally."

"The American Farm Bureau Federation, believing it is contrary to the public interest, is opposed to placing a tariff on lumber, either rough or dressed. It is committed to a definite, constructive fore preservation

and reforestation policy."

"The federation also declared against tariff on fertilizer."

"Mr. Regulation Asked."

A committee was appointed consisting of John Brown, Indiana; W. G. Jamison, Colorado, and Chester H. Gray, Missouri, to make a study of Muscle Shoals nitrate project in Tennessee, to hire necessary engineers, and report their findings to the executive committee.

"The federation recommends that there should be necessary legislation concerning the meat packing industry and livestock marketing to insure the livestock producers against unfair practices. We reaffirm our previous resolutions asking for fair and just packing legislation."

"We believe any regulatory control should be vested in the United States department of agriculture rather than in a separate commission."

"The federation recommends that the farmer stand in opposition to the 1 per cent federal excise tax on land, formerly known as the Nolan bill and instructs our Washington office to make our action known to congress."

FRUIT MAY BE FROST DAMAGED

TEMPERATURE DOWN TO 28 FRIDAY

Eastern Frosts Increased Prospects For Western Markets Says Cove Fruit Man.

Frost Friday night probably did slight damage to the fruit in the

Cove section, according to Karl I. Stackland, of Cove, who was in the Grande Saturday. Mr. Stackland stated that the thermometer went down to 28 degrees and that the fruit is now so far advanced that it is possible that slight damage was done, but that it would be several days before it could be definitely determined. However, it is unlikely that the crop was injured in an alarming degree. Mr. Stackland also stated that probably the wind and the dampness of the ground prevented damage.

In discussing the effect of frosts on fruit crops in other sections of the country, he said that the four frosts in the east and middle west during the month of April increased the prospects of a favorable market for western fruits about 100 per cent.

A month ago indications were that eastern buyers would offer a very low price for cherries because of the prospective crop in the middle west. Conditions have now changed so that the middle west must draw on the western crop and this will mean a boost in prices for the farmers of Union county and the other fruit sections of the west.
