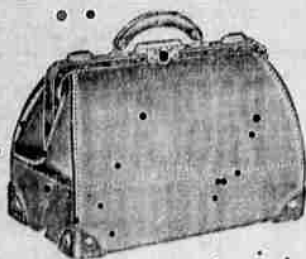

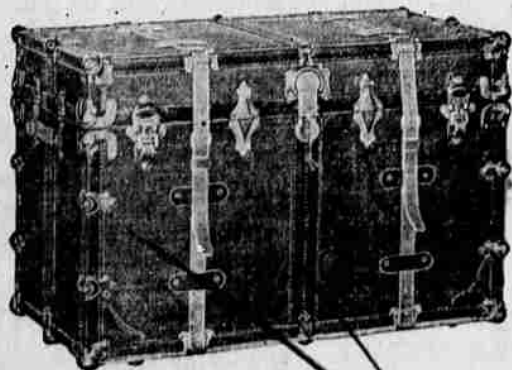

WORK ON CHERRY'S GREENHOUSES WAS STARTED MONDAY

Work on the additions to Cherry's Greenhouses began Monday. When completed the new greenhouses will be the largest between Portland and Boise. Three new greenhouses are being built and one of the old ones is being rebuilt. The new ones are 36 by 104 feet and when completed the plant will have 25,000 square

feet of glass. It is believed that the additions will be finished in sixty days.

Walter Thompson, who has the contract for the erection of the new greenhouses arrived from Portland Monday morning with a crew of five expert greenhouse builders and began work on the buildings that afternoon.

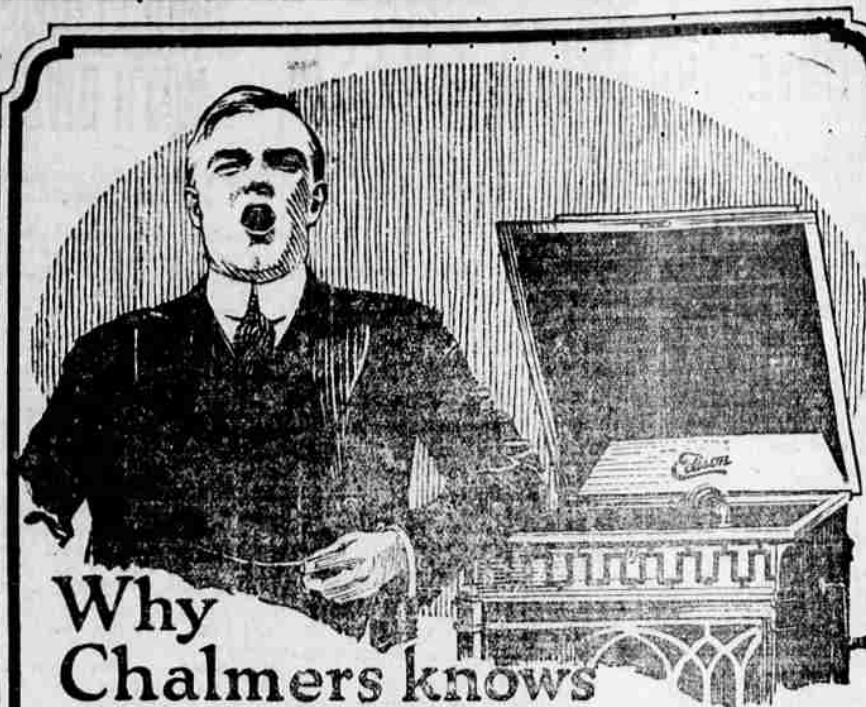

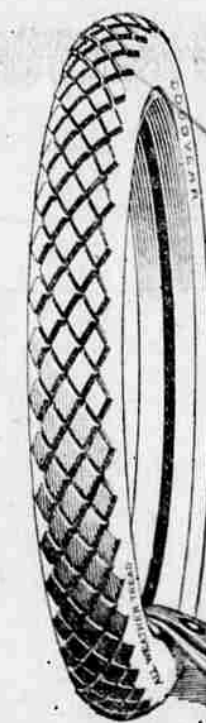
