SERVICE MEN HOLD BONUS BILL BOOSTER

Gratitude from a grateful people who had been defended and saved from enemy invasion. What consideration is voted at the special election in June should be measured in gratitude, the money feature being secondary. In other words, when voters vote for the Soldiers Bill and the bill carries, such votes should be cast by grateful hearts at being able to do something to assist the boys who went to their country's call.
Only Fair to Service Men
Dr. Jos. Lingo spoke from the standpoint of the service men. He said it was only the desire of the boys to have something that would in a way balance the ledger between those who went and those who did not go but stayed and enjoyed the lucrative wages and emoluments which war always brings due to the man shortage at home. His position was that no soldier should feel a bit back-

ward in asking support for the soldiers bill and make himself clear on the subject.
Lyle Huron, told of the organization being effected for the campaign and explained the workings of the different committees and department organization.

Elverson, state adjutant of the American Legion, is expected at that meeting when further plans for the Soldier bill will be discussed.

RELIEF BY RED CROSS GREATER

More Service Men Also Aided—Loans Made to Service Men in Past Are Being Repaid.
According to the report of Mrs. Fay Cutler, executive secretary of the local chapter of the Red Cross, during the month of April aid was given to 58 service men or their families and a thirty-eight civilian families, a total of 122.
This represents a considerable increase over the previous month when aid was given in only seventy-five cases, fifty-three being service men or their families and twenty-two being civilian relief cases during March.
Much Detail Work
The relief given entailed 204 visits, 45 telephone calls and 320 office consultations. Besides this ten telegrams were sent out and 142 letters were sent out. In addition to this large amount of office work, Mrs. Cutler made out numerous claims for compensation-service men have due them from the government.
The total amount of money dispensed in giving relief was \$42 to service men and \$44.99 to civilians. The Red Cross was reimbursed during the month to the extent of \$169.50, which represents loans to service men, which were made in the past and which were paid during the month.
More Money Received
The amount of monthly income service men are receiving from government adjustments made through the Red Cross increased to \$1059, having been only \$787 in March. Having April adjustments were made back claims against the government totaling \$422.50. The total money brought into the chapter through adjustments made for service men was \$1586.99 in May.

Well Known to Many Union County People—Was Interested in North Powder.
The funeral of Jerry Lenroot, retired grain dealer, who hung himself in Baker a few days ago, will be held in Union this afternoon and burial will take place in the Union cemetery.
Mr. Lenroot had gone blind and it worried him to the extent that he finally hung himself in his garage Monday, using an electric cord to commit the deed. He was a man well fixed financially and had extensive property interests.
Many people in this county knew him very well and all were his friends. Lenroot had been a resident of Baker for three years. He lived at North Powder and Union previously, and had property and business interests in North Powder. He was 54 years of age and is survived by his wife and daughter.
