CONFESSION IS EXPLAINED

Every seat was taken, both in the large auditorium and gallery, by a capacity crowd which assembled last night at the Catholic church to listen to the lecture on the doctrine of confession of sins to a priest by Rev. Father Donegan.

"No doctrine or practice of the Catholic church is so much opposed, to none is there such a deep-rooted antipathy on the part of most non-Catholics than to the doctrine and practice of confession" he said. "The reason is that the doctrine and its origin is misunderstood.

"Christ came to earth to teach and save all men. Now in the work of salvation provision must be made for forgiveness of sins. Christ had the power to forgive sins; He claimed and exercised this right during His life. The woman taken in adultery, the Magdalene, the man sick of the palsy, were some of those who felt His mercy and received His forgiveness. Furthermore, Christ had the right to give His power to others to forgive sin, and this is exactly what He did.

"Read St. John, chapter 20, verse 19, when Christ after His resurrection appeared to the apostles. 'Receive ye the Holy Ghost.' He said to them: 'Whose sins ye shall forgive they are forgiven,' whose sins ye shall retain shall be retained.'

Delegates sent by President Harding," he said, "to pardon, to parole, to retain prisoners in prison are given power to act for him. In order to exercise this power they must examine the evidence for and against the man in question and then reach their conclusion. Who ever they keep in prison must be retained there. The same is true of Christ and His apostles. He had the power to pardon, and He gave that power to the apostles. Now, in order that they exercise this power the evidence must be presented to them and that can only be done by the confession of sins, by one seeking forgiveness, the only God and the sinner know the sins. Nor did this power cease with the death of the apostles. It was granted to them as officials of the church of Christ, and was handed down by them to their successors just as the power of the president is handed down to each successor of the office. There is just as much need of the power today as at the time of the apostles, and if we grant the transmission of the power to baptize, preach and other powers, why deny that of forgiveness of sins.

"History," he continued, "clearly bears witness to the claim and the existence in the church from the time of Christ.

And then Father Donegan traced the power back through the ages quoting from various non-Catholic sources to show that from the time of Christ confession has existed in the Catholic Church.

Explaining the confession in practice, the speaker pointed out that "sorrow for sin and a determination to keep away from sin" were absolutely necessary before sin would be forgiven.

"Restoration of stolen goods, making good lies about a neighbor and avoiding dangerous persons or places must also be promised before absolution is granted.

"We confess to a priest," he said
