SECESSION MAY RE- SULT IF KATHERINE CREEK ROAD IS BUILT

many times and compromises arrived at.

Union Is Too Late.

Judge Crawford showed that in order to have the Katherine Creek road designated as a market road it would be necessary to have a survey made by the state highway engineers and that by the time this was completed, the bids advertised, etc., it will be too late to build the road this year. He suggested that Union withdraw her objections to the use of the \$26,000 already appropriated for the road and wait until next year with the building of the Katherine Creek road, having the road designated as a market road and the proper survey made this year and using funds becoming available next year for market roads.

The Telocast-Medical Springs road is the only road that can absorb the money appropriated this year, he stated.

Union Sees Benefit.

A number of Union men responded in behalf of the Katherine Creek road and quoted figures to show what a benefit it would be to have that road built. John Jacobs, of the Jacobs Bros. Lumber company, pointed out that his company hauled several million feet of lumber during the past two years and that they could have cut double that amount if the road had been open at all seasons.

Arthur McDow, mail carrier on the route up Katherine Creek and part of the other route, pointed out that he served more mail boxes up the Katherine Creek route and that where the sun strikes the Katherine Creek route the snow "goes out almost as quick as on Lyons Hill," on the other route.

Completes McDow's Figures.

Mr. Wright replied to Mr. McDow by saying that Mr. McDow's route doesn't come within four miles of Medical Springs and that in that four miles there are many people who receive their mail at Medical Springs. He also called attention to the enormous amount of mail arriving daily on the stage from Baker.

North Powder and Haines, he continued, ship more produce than any other stations on the O.-W. between Portland and Huntington. Other residents of the Big Creek valley offered their services in aiding in building the road they prefer and promised that many others would do likewise. Most of the road work done in their section, they pointed out, was done by the residents without aid from the county.

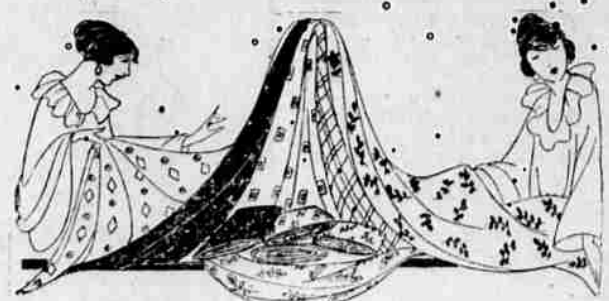
