 The Japanese peace delegate. "The question regarding Shantung and that regarding racial equality cannot be treated in the same light," he says. "The statement made by Mr. Lansing in this connection is probably only his own misconception, as he was not present at the meeting at which the final decision regarding Shantung was arrived at."
 "The Japanese delegates had twice interviewed President Wilson in this matter between April 21 and April 30, and, after the matter had been submitted to the Four Power conference the agreement regarding Shantung was arranged. Mr. Lansing, not being the highest representative of America, did not take part in these meetings and his statements regarding Shantung are only his own ideas of what took place."
 Viscount Makino denies flatly that he and Count Chinda had an interview with Mr. Lansing, while the Viscount denies and knowledge of any member of the Japanese delegation ever hinting at a possible rupture between Japan and America in event of the Japanese demands being rejected, as stated in the Lansing memoirs.
 Many heated discussions took place in the conference days, the Viscount, with each delegation attempting to carry his own points but no delegation ever descended to the level of making threats.

CITY RECEIVES TAX MONEYS
 The weekly report of City Manager Garrett shows that the preliminary line for the Lower Beaver Creek project, which has been staked out under the direction of R. E. Koon, of the firm of Stevens and Kooni has been shortened approximately 4,000 feet from that run last year by Mr. Kelley, the corrections made, if this project is decided on as the most feasible, meaning a great saving in the construction of the new water system.
 The report also shows that taxes amounting to \$39,929.67 have been turned over to Mrs. E. M. Fowler, city treasurer. The total receipts of the treasurer's office for the past week, ending April 30, were \$32,917.09. General warrants and interest on general warrants amounting to \$3721.08 were paid during the week.
 During the week the police department reported six new quarantines, two of which were for influenza, these being the first cases of that malady discovered during the current season. One house was released from quarantine.

BIG KLAMATH FALLS SAWMILL TO RESUME OPERATIONS AT ONCE
 KLAMATH FALLS, May 6.—A announcement has been made that the sawmill of the Pelican Bay Lumber company, one of the largest concerns in this section will resume operation at once. Resumption of operations at this mill means an addition of about 40 men to the payroll.
 Announcement also was made by the Big Lumber company that its mill will resume with one shift early in May. The output of this mill is about 50,000 board feet daily. It is reported.

JUDGE ANDERSON REFUSES CASE TO GO TO TRIAL NOW

Judge Gustav Anderson, of Baker City, yesterday afternoon granted a motion by attorneys for the defendant to stay trial in the case of Ed. Cronson vs. Brooks, Campbell on the ground that the plaintiff had taken an appeal to the state supreme court in a case in which the evidence was almost identical. The previous case was tried before Judge G. W. Phelps of the sixth judicial district, of Pendleton, the decision in this case finding for the defendant in the law action and dismissing the equitable defense.
 In presenting his decision Judge Anderson pointed out that the facts in the two cases were substantially the same, the complaint and the defense being also substantially the same. "So long as the previous judgment stands that judgment is a bar to further proceedings," he declared. He further stated that it is not for his court to decide whether the judgment previously rendered is correct or incorrect. The case involves possession of a farm.
