STATE GRANGE MASTER DELAYED

GRANGE HALL, May 5.—(Special.)—Yesterday, after the usual business was taken care of and a most appetizing dinner was served, the following program was put on at the grange meeting. Groat; Grange Echoes, edited and read by Mrs. Clarence Redhead. Walter Pierce discussed the five measures that will be put before the people at a special election in June. He also spoke on the ever-interesting subject, "The Chicago Board of Trade."

Mr. Pierce returned Saturday from Corvallis where he attended the annual meeting of the board of regents of the Oregon Agricultural College. "It is very interesting," says Mr. Pierce, "to note the tremendous increase of the military equipment at Corvallis. The activities are increasing very rapidly; where a few years ago, one West Point man was employed to train the boys of the college town, now twenty-four trained West Point men are there. There are eighty-nine government paid officers and men, over one hundred horses, guns of all kinds and descriptions, from the light field gun to the massive machine gun. A degree is conferred for military science, which paves the way for a commission in the army. Two hundred and forty boys are taking special military training. This has become the largest place of military equipment west of the Rocky Mountains. What does this mean? Does it mean war? Does it mean war with Japan?"
