Acceptance of Reception Invitations

No written regret or acceptance is necessary on receipt of any type of at home or afternoon tea card. The invited guest accepts by attending the function. If it is impossible to put in an appearance at the hour signified in the invitation, the proper course is to send by post a visiting card in an envelope so that it will reach the hostess, if possible, on the day of the reception. A husband and wife, if unable to appear, send one card each when the invitation has been sent in the name of the hostess only. If sent in the name of the hostess and her husband, one of the wife's and two of her husband's cards should be returned. The great point is to send the cards so that they will arrive the afternoon of the reception no earlier and no later. When several members of a family are invited to a reception and but one of the group is able to attend, and that person is a woman, she can, by leaving the cards of the others with her own on the tray in the hostess' hall obviate the necessity of posting cards as directed above.
