## EARLY PIONEER PASSES AWAY

WAS FIRST WHITE CHILD BORN WEST OF ROCKIES.

Has Been Prominent in Grange and G. A. R. Affairs, One of Organizers of Indian Veterans.

ALBANY, Ore., May 6.—Cyrus H. Walker, prominent pioneer, died here Thursday, aged 82. Mr. Walker was the second white child born west of the Rocky Mountains. He was born at Whitman Mission, now Walla Walla, soon after the arrival there of his parents.

Mr. Walker was prominent in Grange and G. A. R. work, and was one of the organizers of the Veterans of the Indian Wars.

It is the plan of the lessee to have the place ready for travel by stock show time early in June, and the indications now are that it will be one of the big places of the city at that time. The opening will be one of the big events of eastern Oregon for the year.

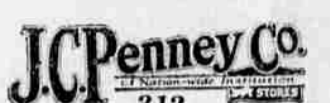
